

Letter from the Minister Faith and Doubt

I have a lot of time for the writer Timothy Keller, and recently he has pointed to one of the major paradoxes of our day when he says.


> "We live in an age when both belief and scepticism are on the rise "

It's true. Our generation is more open to exploring the 'spiritual' side of life than the generation before us, while at the same time we are not slow in asking questions and voicing doubts, particularly when it comes to Christianity.

And rightly so! Even when we set to one side the crude belligerence of the so called 'New Atheists'. championed by the likes of Richard Dawkins, there are times when even the most devout believer has had to face up to serious questions about their faith. For example . . .

- ♦ Is it not arrogance to believe that Jesus is the only way to the Father?
- ♦ How can we believe in a good God, when he allows so much suffering?
- ♦ How can we claim that our faith sets us free - is it not more likely the opposite?
- ♦ How can we say we follow the 'Prince of Peace', when religion seems to cause so many wars?
- ♦ How can we say 'God is love' and still believe in Hell?
- ♦ How can we still believe in God in the face of the rise of science?
- ♦ How can we use the Bible as our quide, when it seems to be full of contradictions?

One of the signs of a grow-



is not a bad thing. It forces us to focus on why we believe something, and why it is important to us. It forces us to keep an open mind, and not get too set in our ways. It keeps us on our toes and keeps our faith alive

In his first letter to the church at Corinth, Paul likens the Christians there to infants, still having to make do with milk, when by now they should have progressed to more solid foods. In the coming weeks. we plan to offer a menu of such solid foods at our 51X30 service on Sunday evenings in the Kirkgate Cafe. Over the course of seven weeks we will be giving a series of talks based on some of the major questions that cause us to doubt. A small team of speakers will take it in turn to do this, drawing on material from Timothy Keller's book. The Reason for God', and there will be plenty of time for reflection and discussion.

The Kirkgate Café is exactly that - a café, which means tea and coffee will be available throughout. You can aim for 6.30pm, or you can come early. Everyone is welcome.

The series begins on

Sunday 20th September.

They have made a massive impact on our local teens!

As usual, Liberton Kirk played a massive role in hosting 30 people for the week, making their Scottish experience so much more comfortable and authentic. Thank you for looking after them all so kindly! Other churches joined in the welcome by providing daily lunches. The launch service and barbecue were hosted by Liberton Northfield.

On the Thursday evening we had the joyful headache of finding a new venue for our closing banquet, as we knew that more teens would come the next night than we could squeeze into Ferniehill Church. At the last minute, Faith Mission Bible College came to our rescue. Our McLean volunteers transformed

the College quadrangle into a beautiful Wedding Reception and 150 people feasted on pizza and candy floss! That evening, 13 stood to say they have chosen to welcome Christ into their lives. It



was a wonderful end to a powerful week- a wee taste of heaven! Thanks again to all who made this possible. Your work is greatly appreciated and hugely worthwhile.

wool you may have, and patterns for the hats and toys. This box will be in the halls from September.

These leaflets will give you suggestions of what to put in the boxes as well as all the instructions. There will also be a box in the fover for donations which you might like to give, if you are unable to fill a shoebox. Any contributions will be gratefully accepted. Church Talents Concert


You will see that this month our young people will be getting the change to participate in a concert for the congregation.







I hope you all had a lovely summer break and enjoyed the few warm days that we did have.



"I have been driven many times to my knees by the overwhelming conviction that I had nowhere else to go. My own wisdom and that of those about me seemed insufficient."

If John or Ruth invited us to stand during a Sunday morning service if we believed that prayer works - I hope most or all of us would stand! If they asked us to remain standing because we had an answer to prayer

that week - would we still be standing?

If they asked us to stand because we needed prayer support in our lives at that time - would we?

The Prayer Stations, and the Prayer Tree, are our opportunity to go to God with our prayers.

- we may need encouragement for our Christian pilgrimage
- we may need support in praying for somebody else
- we may be responding to something God said to us during the service
- we may be giving thanks for prayer answered
- we may need to sit and weep quietly for unanswered prayer...

The Prayer Stations at the East Door and at the back door (except upstairs in the Gallery on west door side at last Sunday morning of the month) and the Prayer Tree situated at the East Door, are channels for each of us to use for whatever reason may prompt us to seek God in prayer.

The Prayer Team members are available to stand with you in prayer as fellow-pilgrims not as experts.

Prayer does work and it does change things - doesn't it? The Prayer Team

Children and Young People



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Sir David Baird, 2nd Baronet of Newbyth

In the Elder's room in Liberton Kirk, stand several tombstones of the Baird family who at one time were major landowners in Liberton parish. One of the stones, numbered **CH7** in my survey of 2001, commemorates Sir David Baird, 2nd Baronet of Newbyth, who died on 7th January 1852 aged 57, having inherited the title from his uncle General Sir David Baird G.C.B., K.C. 1st Baronet of Newbyth, when he died childless on 18th August 1829.

I published the life of General Sir David Baird in the May 2011 edition of the Kirk magazine. In his "Annals of Liberton", published by Rev. Campbell Ferenbach in 1975, he attributes the memorial erroneously to the honour of the General who died in 1829, and not to his nephew who died some 23 years later.

Sir David married Lady Anne Kennedy, eldest daughter of Archibald 1st Marquis of Ailsa, in August 1821, and they had a large family including Robert Wynne and Archibald, who were both drowned while attending school at Cullercoates near Whitley Bay in 1845. Another son William Arthur was a Major in the 42nd Highlanders and was mortally wounded in the Ashantee campaign in 1874 and is buried in Sierra Leone (See memorial CH9).

Sir David served as an Ensign with the 3rd Foot Guards at Waterloo where he suffered a serious face wound while defending Hougoumont Steading. He was a noted sportsman who took part in Curling, Golf, and horse racing. While taking part in a hunt at Marchmont in late December 1851, he was repeatedly kicked on the leg and suffered fatal injuries, dving several days later.

CH8 (Translation of Latin inscription) Ae.M.S. Here lies in peace, John Baird of Newbyth, Lord of Sessions who died 27th April 1698 aged 78. His wife Margaret, eldest daughter of William Hay of Linplum Bt. Who died July 1707 aged 90. Here also lies his son William Baird of Newbyth Bt. Died 17th February 1737 aged 83. His wife Helen Gilmour daughter of John Gilmour Bt. of Craigmillar, Lord of Session, who died 21st April 1701, aged 47. This monument was erected by their son John Baird of Newbyth to the memory to his parents.

CH9 Vi et Virtute. In memory of Robert and Archibald Baird aged 17 and 16 years, sons of Sir David and Lady Anne Baird of Newbyth, who were drowned while bathing near Sunderland on 15th October 1845. The eldest having lost his own life in a gallant attempt to save his brother, the delight and pride of a happy home. These promising youths were swept away on the verge of manhood and are interred here in the same grave, that they may arise and enjoy together a happy eternity in heaven, is the ardent prayer of their sorrowing parents. William Arthur Baird, brother of the above, Major in the 42nd Royal Highlanders, born 1834, was mortally wounded in the Ashantee campaign in 1874, whilst gallantly leading a portion of his regiment against the enemy. He was buried at Sierra Leone.

Other Baird memorials in the Elders Room are CH6 and 7


Stone **E185** In the churchyard near the west door of the Kirk stands a large table stone in memory of the Baird family who are I believe close relatives of the above family. The stone reads - The burial place of Robert Baird, tenant in Grange, and James Baird portioner at Guardwell. Here lie interred, John Baird

who died 5th August 1693and the said Robert and James Baird, and 13 of their children, also John Baird tenant in Lochend, who died 5th September 1776 and his spouse: John Baird, tenant in Hillend who died 30th June 1817 and Marv Cockburn his spouse. William Baird, tenant in Lochend, died 10th March 1828: Janet Cleghorn his spouse, and Janet Baird their daughter: Robert Baird, merchant in Edinburgh died 3rd November 1848 aged 62. Anne Callender wife of the above Robert Baird died 23rd December 1871 in her 90th year, and 3 children. Vans Craigie Baird, wine merchant, Edinburgh, died 8th May 1850 aged 56. Elizabeth Smith his spouse died 3rd March 1848 aged 53. William Baird, deputy controller of G.P.O. died 25th May 1895, his wife Catherine Smith Baird died 21st December 1912, his son Robert, banker in Egypt, buried in Lisbon 22nd Mav 1880, his daughter Mary Stuart Callender, died 25th June 1932




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




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

Appointments can be made by telephone to see him at other times, but please note that he is **not** available through the day on Mondays.


