

#### Letter from the Assistant Minister

In my younger years one of the places I liked to go was Selkirk Glass. It was a glasswork shop where vou could watch the items being made, and it was also a café where I developed my love of carrot cake.

No matter how much cake was left they always cut it, but if I got the person who knew my parents I knew I'd get a hefty slice.

My mother had an ornament of a small vase with glass flowers in it that came from Selkirk Glass. She really liked it, and I broke it. I didn't relish the thought of telling her I had decimated her prized ornament on the mantelpiece, nor her reaction.

So, I removed the evidence until I found the time about a week later to cycle the 6 miles to Selkirk Glass and find a replacement. My plan was to say, 'Sorry I broke your ornament, here's a replacement.'

When we look around at some of the things in the world and we

know instinctively that they're just not right, or even things within ourselves that aren't right, they

can feel broken. And the fix isn't as simple as cycling to pick up a replacement.

But we do know the creator of the world, and of ourselves and it makes sense to turn to him at these times

Although things can feel broken the good news is that God is in the business of renewal, both for ourselves and the world. In Titus chapter 3 Paul writes:

"He saved us through the washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit."

My mother turned out to be a lot more understanding than I thought she would be. God is the ultimate forgiving parent, maybe it's time you were pleasantly surprised by him?

























#### Annual Memorial Service






#### SEECAT Quiet Morning


The morning will end with lunch together. Tea and coffee etc. will be provided, but you should bring

She and her family lived in Liberton Drive, and after leaving school, Christine attended the Edinburgh College of Domestic Science to do a catering course. After a cooks job with the Church of Scotland, in Edinburgh, she found her ideal post at Carberry Towers at Musselburgh where she worked in the kitchen, on reception and in the office.

Christine had many interests: singing in the junior choir, the Church choir, the Guild Singers and in the Service of Nine Lessons at Christmas.

Drama was very important to her, and to Douglas, whom she married in 1948.

Between them, they transformed the Drama Group, and many will remember the splendid performances that were produced every year.

Christine and Douglas also worked together to run a Saturday evening Youth Club, catering for youngsters in Liberton and The Inch - not an easy job; but one they did well.

She was an enthusiastic worker for Christian Aid, organising the street collections in Liberton for many years. Her talent for organising was also obvious in the Woman's Guild where she was treasurer for several committees.

She had a long and fulfilled life, and the many people who attended her service in Liberton Kirk showed how much she was respected and admired. Ann Weir

#### Poppies at Liberton

There are many memorials to those who lost their lives in WW1.

After 1919 officially those who were injured, and subsequently passed away, have no memorial, and this year in particular we want to honour them and those who also served in the war as nurses, ambulance drivers, cooks, auxiliaries, train drivers, stable hands, those who worked in factories and fields, and the many thousands who supported those fighting on land, on sea and in the air.




Many of those people were so debilitated that they succumbed to the flu epidemic which killed millions. We would like to honour those who were contributing to the war but did not wear uniform, and were treated so badly by members of the public that the government had to issue triangular badges for them to wear which stated 'On war service'. (We have one of these in the exhibition in the kirk).

We want to honour those whose lives changed radically with the loss of limbs, loss of minds, loss of family, loss of friends, loss of previous jobs – my dad was an apprentice engineer who signed up under age but was then too old to get back his apprenticeship after the war.

So thank you to all who have made poppies whether it was just one or like many people including the pupils and staff of George Heriot's who made hundreds. Thank you to the makers in the UK from Shetland to Cornwall, Australia, New Zealand, South America, Europe, from Scouts, Guides, Brownies, residential homes, craft groups – everyone.



#### Faith Stories from Roger & Caroline Barlee

We met in 1983 at the Gilbert and Sullivan Society in Aberdeen University and have enjoyed singing together ever since. We married in 1987 and have 3 adult children and one grandson. We came to Liberton Kirk in 2010.

#### Roger

I grew up in Edinburgh in an active Christian family & I have never felt that I was not a Christian. We moved Churches when I was 8 and, being quite shy, I never joined the Sunday School but went into the services with my parents. I was confirmed at 17 (too early) and when I went to University I joined the Bible study in my halls of residence. I left again a month or so later when I, incorrectly, thought that I would have to take a turn at leading. Despite leaving so quickly, they gave me a Bible on my 18<sup>th</sup> birthday that I still use to this day.

At my previous church, I was ordained as an elder and, as the "young" elder, was then immediately asked to run the teenagers group. With no experience of being in a youth group I said yes and greatly enjoyed my 16 years running Pathfinders. I have no doubt that this was the best decision I ever made as my confidence in my faith grew exponentially answering the challenging questions that teenagers can come up with.

Since moving to Liberton I have become involved in speaking at evening worship and look forward to wherever God takes me next.

#### Caroline

I grew up in Fort William in a Christian family - my Dad was a church organist and elder - and I worked my way up through the many stages of Sunday school, to the teenage Bible study group to ...... well at 16, unlike all my church friends, I felt unready to join the church and so took a step back. After a few years of independence at Aberdeen University, I felt drawn to find out more about the Christian faith and so sought out a communicants' class.

I have been on an interesting journey with God since accepting Jesus as my Saviour. Most of that time I have walked along fairly steadily, but at certain points of grief or crisis in my life I have ultimately drawn closer to the Lord, and I've been aware of Him leading me through. I've learned just how much God loves me and learned that He never gives up on us. Since coming to Liberton Kirk I have become an elder and subsequently a Link Group leader and have joined the prayer team. I have also been challenged to explore my spiritual gifts, which has deepened my relationship with Father God.



#### Money Matters - Standing Order for Liberton Kirk

Last month, the Finance Team explained about the shortfall or deficit in the Kirk's finances and asked everyone to help to eradicate the deficit. With this month's magazine we have supplied a leaflet containing Gift Aid and Standing Order forms. The Gift Aid form is for those members who pay income tax (or even Capital Gains tax) and have not completed a form before ,or have not given me one in the last couple of years. This may be the case for new members; but if in doubt, or if you have any questions, do give me a phone (number on the back of the magazine). The Treasurer can claim from HMRC another quarter of what you pay to Liberton Kirk, so that every 80p given becomes £1.

The Standing Order form can be used whether Gift Aid can be claimed or not. If you wish to give by standing order you can fill it in and send it either to me ,or to the Treasurer. We will then pass it to the bank to process in the usual way. However, it is much simpler for you to go to your on-line banking (if you have that arranged) and either set up a new standing order (in the same way as you may have done for any other regular payment you make to relatives or other charities) or change the one you already have by changing the amount for the next due date. If you are setting up a new standing order all the information you need is on the form in the leaflet: sort code, account name and account number.

I found it straightforward, and hope that you do too.
