

Letter from the Minister A better world?

It was *The Byrds* - a folk/pop group from the sixties, who put the Old Testament book of Ecclesiastes on the map in today's culture when they released a song based on a poem in Ecclesiastes chapter 3. It's a poem which speaks of some of the certainties of life and it begins -

> For everything there is a time, and for every activity under the heavens, a season: a time to be born and a time to die,

> a time to plant and a time to uproot,


a time to kill and a time to heal,...

Ecclesiastes is not the most cheerful of books, and if you were to read it through you might be forgiven for ending up thinking about your own life, and asking the question "Is this it? Is this all I have to look forward to?"

The good news is that the writer of Ecclesiastes lived long before the coming of Jesus. Had he lived in Jesus day he might have adopted a different tone entirely, because the message of Easter is a huge "No it is not!"

Of course, there will always be cynics who, at the time, might well have said -


the world in which they lived.

"Ah, but it didn't last! Was not Jesus crucified, and all his followers scattered? And is not this the fate of any movement that sets out to change the realities of life in a fallen world? It's all very well dreaming of Utopia, but it never lasts. Not in the real world."

Except that the dream didn't end with Jesus death. As Wolfgang Pannenberg, the 20th Century theologian, says, if Jesus Christ rose from the dead, then he really <u>is</u> Lord of Heaven and Earth. And his new Kingdom did last, and it spread throughout the known world, and it is still in evidence to this day.

It is because Jesus rose from the dead that all things are still possible. Even building a better world - one that will last.

Youth News

Here's A Little Story . . .

It's Sunday afternoon just following our annual Youth Service, which hosts all of the Uniform Organisations that use our halls. I'm pondering on the fact that while some folk remarked that it was a lovely service, I wondered how many know about the weeks which lead up to it each year? And, what did we learn today?

It's wonderful that we have so many young people using our halls each week, so we are always thinking of ways in which we can engage, support, and show some of Jesus' love into their groups. This event each year gives us youth workers an opportunity to join each group (14 in total) and share something from the Bible. This year our lovely theme was Friendship. We played a fun game which highlighted the theme, and then talked about the friendship that Peter and Jesus shared. We talked to the children about how Peter nearly ruined the friendship by denying Jesus on Good Friday, and that we too often mess up in our own friendships. Doing 14 visits multiple times a year can be a bit challenging; but talking openly with young people about something so fundamentally human, has been a rewarding way to communicate how much Jesus means to us personally. Which leads me to this morning's service - when John, Emily and I were able to share how wonderfully Peter had been forgiven.

John taught us from John chapter 21 that not only did Jesus forgive Peter and mend their friendship, but he confirmed his original plan that Peter would be the rock on which he would build his church. Surely Peter would have been knocked over with such love and mercy! I got to thinking myself - how many times have I messed up with God, and yet he's forgiven me! Not only does he forgive us when we mess up, but he still gladly uses us to share the Good News, he still joyously calls us sons and daughters of the King, and he still wants us to spend eternity with him! God is so very good to us. I hope that just as Peter was utterly amazed at Jesus' love for him, we too will be immensely impacted by God's unending love for us.

We sang a song nearer the end called "Here's A Little Story" by Fischy Music. It is definitely stuck in my head now; but that's a good thing - because it holds a dear truth: "Jesus never, ever, ever, ever, ever, ever gives up - even when we mess up!"


GOOD FRIDAY (19th April)







Faith Story from Denis Turner


Suria - A Dau to Remember with Food for Thought!

Hi all, Laura here.

Firstly, the volunteers and I, at MOPS would like to thank you all for your prayers, support and encouragement for getting us off the ground. It was a busy few months after John asked me if I would take this on; but we (finally) got there!

For those you who haven't heard about MOPS from me or John (or Jonny, or Ruth, or Linda). MOPS = $\underline{\mathbf{M}}$ others $\underline{\mathbf{O}}$ f $\underline{\mathbf{P}}$ re- $\underline{\mathbf{S}}$ choolers. It is run by Christian woman, many of whom are mums - For Mums. It is a space where women can meet other Mums. The big difference MOPS has from a group such as Toddlers, is that at MOPS, we encourage our Mums to put their children in the crèche that we provide. This way they can relax (a bit), talk, get to know each other, and have breakfast.

Each week we will have a topic to explore and discuss. In our first week we talked about some of the ridiculous (only to people outside of the family) things Mums do for their kids. For example: wearing bikini bottoms for underwear, because the kids' clothes are clean but yours aren't ... or only ironing one **kid's** bedding because **they** hate the way the creases feel; but the others don't care ... We also discussed what it would look like to 'burn your to-do list'; to spend more time enjoying your children, rather than worrying about what is the next chore that needs to be done.

9.15am on 8th March was our first meeting, and we had hopes of having roughly 4/5 Mums join us, as this is a new venture. By 9.40am we had 9 mums (I counted them twice) round our table in the small hall. Some are first time Mums, and some have more than one child. Nyree Chittick our wonderful Mentor Mum was there to keep the conversation flowing; but it needed little help. We have hope that these Mums will feel comfortable to return to us over the coming weeks, until the summer.

If you know of a Mum who would like to join us please pass on our information! I would also like to thank Emily and all the lovely volunteers who are giving up every second Friday morning to play with the kiddos in the crèche!




