



#### A time for silence and a time for speaking

I'm always fascinated by the way that names can stick. When my eldest Grandchild, Holly, was learning to speak, she couldn't quite manage all the consonants in the term 'Grandpa', so, instead she made do, as an approximation, with 'Papa'. Ever since then the name 'Papa' has stuck.

One of my favourite memories of Holly was when we were once wandering round a supermarket together. I was trying to think of all the things I had to buy, and she was busy chattering away to me about all she could see. I thought I was doing a rather good job of pretending to be attentive until suddenly I felt her little hand tugging at my sleeve, and I heard her stern young voice say, "Papa, I'm TALKING to vou!"

We live in a noisy world, full of competing demands on our attention. and sometimes we too have difficulty having our voices heard.

I've been slowly working my way through Eugene Peterson's "Reversed" Thunder", a highly illuminating exploration of the book of Revelation. In it he comments on the degree of noise in the world around us, and the fact that the variety and volume of noise seems to be on the increase.

> Let's take a moment to listen to what he has to sav . . . . \*

"The world is a mob in which everyone is talking at once and no one is able or willing to listen. But God listens ....

... It is rare to find anyone who listens carefully and thoroughly. It is rare to find our stammering understood, our clumsy speech deciphered, our garbled syntax unravelled, sorted out and heard - every syllable attended to, every nuance comprehended. Our minds are taken seriously, our feelings are taken seriously. When it happens we know that what we sav and feel are immensely important. We acquire dignity..."

Stirring though these thoughts may be, Peterson saves the best to the end, finishing with...

"We never know how well we think or speak, until we find someone who listens to us"

By the time you read these words. the season of Lent will have begun - a time to spend time with the God who listens to us. The world may well be noisy, but there are still places of silence if you look for them, and those are the best places for prayer. I wish you God's blessing in your search.

#### Faith Story from Brad Laing

In 2012 I spent 3 months being trained for ministry by Young Life in America; the first month serving at a camp as part of the work crew, and the next two months doing leadership training in Ohio. While I was there one of my mentors was a guy called Jonny, who was a work crew boss and also a staff member in Ohio.

Jonny's big passion was for the ministry *Wyldlife*, the middle school (p7-s2) branch of Young Life, and I got to be part of seeing him launch a Wyldlife club in his old middle school.

Fast forward 18 months when I was on Young Life student staff, I helped launch the first ever Wyldlife club in Scotland alongside Rachel Willis, which ran from the Hub at Tron Kirk. Unfortunately that club ended when both Rachel and myself were called elsewhere, Rachel going to Belfast and me to England.

I moved back up the road in 2017, and began working for Gracemount Church in my local area, and after launching the successful "Summer Lunches" ministry, we found ourselves with a number of kids in the Wyldlife age range. So like Jonny, myself and a few others decided to start a new Wyldlife club in the area, this time running from Gracemount Primary School and focused on reaching local kids with the good news of Jesus.

It is amazing how God uses so many different things in our past (my heart for my local community, my relationship with Jonny and his influence, experience in running a Wyldlife Club preciously etc) to shape his ministry in the future, and this new Wyldlife Club in Gracemount is proof of that.



#### Take a Pew! The History of Seating at Liberton Kirk.

The original church, built with a flat gallery on three sides, seated 1,480 persons, but slower local population growth and the Disruption of 1843 prevented attendance ever requiring such capacity.

In 1882, the seating was reduced to 907 sittings when the current tiered gallery was installed. The plan of the seating is on view in the gallery of Liberton Kirk, and shows 521 ground floor sittings and 386 gallery sittings.

Thenceforth, there have been various reductions in the pew capacity, most notably in 1958, when the front and chancel pews were removed, and in 2007, when the corner ground floor pews disappeared along with some other alterations.

The accepted figure of current capacity is provided by John Rennie in his article for the Greater Liberton Heritage Projects 'Liberton Kirk the first 1000 years' (2005), which gives '725, including 40 individual chairs'. This number obtained by Rennie is accurate based upon the number of pew sittings that remain from the original 1882 layout, but it is debateable how many of these original sittings are either practicable to use or are accessible due to the installation of audio-visual equipment; for example, although all central gallery pews remain extant, it is only feasible to seat a sound engineer and a PowerPoint operator in the front pews, whilst visibility in the pews behind is now obscured by the presence of a television screen. In my view, these factors arguably constitute a reduction in capacity.

Conversely, the foldable bench pews, once used by the boys of Dr. Guthrie's School at the very rear of the gallery, were not included in the original 1882 plan, but remain functional with adequate visibility to the pulpit and should be included in the total capacity calculation.

There is also the matter of individual chairs: whilst the front pews have been truncated, the sittings were replaced by chairs, which now form an almost permanent fixture of the church; therefore, I should consider such individual chair sittings in the overall capacity, including the sixteen chairs at the rear of the ground floor.

But ought the chairs at the west end of the church also be included? I'll let you judge for yourself which parameters you use from the table below.


It is interesting to note that the gallery now has greater capacity than the ground floor.



#### The Way of The Cross

Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow Me.' (Luke 9: 23)

These words of Jesus are spoken at a turning point in the gospel. Jesus challenges the disciples about His identity and their commitment to Him:

'who do the crowds say I am?' (v18).

It is at this point that He *'resolutely set out for Jerusalem'* (Luke 9:51). On our journey through Lent, as we look to events of Good Friday and Easter, what are our priorities as Jesus' disciples to be?

*To deny ourselves:* this means to saying *No* to ourselves and *Yes* to God, as we humbly submit our will to His. Jesus prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane *'not My will but Yours be done.'* (Luke 22:42). It means putting Jesus first in everything: our work, family, ambitions, possessions, marriage, finance and future. We will not be guided by self-interest, but by allowing God to show us how to live in His way.

To take up our cross: this reminds us that the disciple is not immune from suffering, as we follow Jesus along the way of cross. Just as He carried His cross to Golgotha, we cannot avoid experiencing suffering in a fallen world. Every day we are to live in way that demonstrates to everyone that we have died to ourselves, our selfish ways and ambitions, and seek to live for God. It means breaking old selfish habits and ways of thinking, as we allow God to renew us by His Spirit. In all of this we cannot lose, because like Jesus, it is only through death that we find God's new life. 'He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep to gain that which he cannot lose.' (Jim Elliot)


