



THE WORD FOR TODAY

JOHN 14, 1-7: “Do not let your hearts be troubled.”

We've just been celebrating the birth of Jesus at Bethlehem, but after his birth we hear very little of him for thirty years. We know that Mary and Joseph returned with their young son to their home town of Nazareth, near the Sea of Galilee, and there Jesus grew up, learned from Joseph to be a carpenter, and lived a normal human life. Everything changed when he emerged from this obscurity to be baptised by his cousin John the Baptist in the River Jordan and to begin three years of ministry, teaching and preaching and performing many miracles which we read about in the Bible, in the books written by Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, which are called the Gospels.

The words of Jesus in this passage were spoken to his followers not long before he was crucified. To them the future was very uncertain and they didn't fully understand what Jesus had told them. Jesus speaks words of reassurance which resonate with us today, living in uncertain times.



Follow the words of John 14, 1-7, on seven panels around the church. The first is just round the corner on the north wall of this little building and the others are on the east wall of the church (right as you look from here) for panels 2, 3 & 4, and on the west wall (5, 6 and 7). The translation of the Bible used is the New International Version, and you can look it up on the internet under Bible Gateway.

If anybody asks you how you are, chances are that you will reply “Fine”. For a lot of us, however, it might be more truthful to admit that we are OK, but not totally fine. We have been in various stages of lockdown since March, and the number of people catching Covid-19 is again very high, hospitals are busy, and we don’t know when the vaccine will reach us. Most of us are vaguely troubled; most of us would admit to a certain level of anxiety or unease.




Jesus tells us “Do not let your hearts be troubled.” We are urged to trust—in the God who made us, and in his Son. To trust in an awesome, all-powerful God, who keeps his promises. To trust in Jesus, who brings God that much nearer. Jesus is a hand to hold, a shoulder to lean on.

Jesus reminds us by his very existence that God is a giving God—a God who gave us his only Son. He reminds us how much God loves us, and that can be the most wonderful reassurance to troubled hearts.

who became our Saviour and Lord, and our friend for ever.***

It can be quite worrying arriving somewhere late at night, particularly in a foreign country, and seeing “No vacancies” everywhere. This pandemic has brought with it an awareness of the possibility of death which has been disturbing to many. What happens when you die? Where do you go? Is heaven something you have to earn? No chance for me, then. All sorts of questions have crowded in.

Jesus’s friends weren’t living through a pandemic, but they were very aware that Jesus was in danger of being arrested and put to death, and knew that they would also be in danger as his followers. Jesus assures his friends that there is room enough in heaven for everybody. What’s more, he tells them that he is going on ahead to prepare places for them. There will not just be room—there will be a warm welcome!

Help me to hold on to that hope in my heart.*





Here is a wonderful promise from Jesus to his followers—he is coming back. A clear indication that death is not the end and that Jesus will overcome it, and will return.

An assurance too that wherever heaven may be we will have the company of Jesus for ever. He himself will take us there. There is no need to agonise about what will happen when we die—Jesus has gone ahead and our place is secured, and he will be there to take our hand.

**Thomas said to him,

Thomas voices all our doubts for us here. It’s not that Thomas doesn’t believe in God, that he doesn’t trust Jesus, he’s just voicing the doubts that creep in all the time, and he likes to be sure. Is there really a heaven? We have no idea where it is or what it will be like. How can we know we are going there? And how can we know the way? Should we be living our lives differently?

We usually set out for a walk knowing where we were going to end up, and knowing the way, but this is more than a walk. We are talking about our lives. We need to find out what we should be doing.

Help us to overcome them, and trust in your love.*


***Lord Jesus, open my heart to receive you

All too soon the disciples would be seeing Jesus on the cross, but then three days later they would see him risen from the dead and they would begin to understand that this was all part of God’s plan to save the world. They would begin to understand the depth of love that God has for every one of his people, and Jesus’ past words would now make sense.

John wrote his Gospel when he was an old man—he had taken years to fully understand who Jesus was and what was important. In his First Letter (also in the Bible) he talks about love coming from God, and he says “God is love”. As we get to know Jesus we realise more and more that God’s love is there for us unconditionally. We are so blessed!
