

THE WORD FOR TODAY

1 JOHN 3, 16-24: "This is how we know what love is "

This passage is from John's First Letter to the young churches which had grown up in Asia Minor in the 50-60 years since the Resurrection of Jesus. John had lived a long life and had done a lot of thinking about Jesus and just what his faith in him meant to him. Now he was writing to Christians who were surrounded by false teachers and temptations to assure them that what they believed in was true. He wanted to encourage them to live out their faith in their daily lives and above all to live lives of love—love for God and for all his people.

It's a good theme for people emerging from the Covid Crisis, which has affected people's physical and mental health and caused widespread financial hardship. "Be kind to others" has been a plea alongside all the injunctions to keep to the rules. We're reminded that having the vaccine is to benefit others as well as ourselves. These words of John remind us that to love each other is part of the call to be followers of Jesus, who sets us a wonderful example to follow.



Follow the words of this short Blble passage on seven panels around the church. The first is just round the corner on the north wall of this little building and the others are on the east wall of the church (right as you look from here) for panels 2, 3 & 4, and on the west wall (5, 6 and 7). The translation of the Bible used is the New International Version, and you can look it up on the internet under Bible Gateway.

"This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us."

It's staggering, isn't it? The fact that Jesus died on the cross for us. We don't deserve such self-sacrifice. We can know ourselves forgiven, and loved as children of God for ever, because Jesus was prepared to give his life. Why did he do such a thing? For love.

This is the depth of love we have to try to show in our lives.



Lord, your love for me fills me with awe.

Help me to find something of that depth of love within me.

May it grow to fill my life.

Now walk to the right of the church building to find panels 2 and 3



"And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers. If anyone has material possessions and sees his brother in need but has no pity on him, how can the love of God be in him?"

"Love so amazing, so divine, demands my soul, my life, my all." We sing those words in Isaac Watts' beautiful hymn "When I survey the wondrous cross" Such undeserved grace, freely given, surely demands a response.

We may not ever be required to lay down our lives for others, but we are surrounded by human need for love. Love which can be expressed in giving, or in listening, in companionship, in prayer. Can we sacrifice some of our money, or our time, to show that love?



Lord, thank you for the example you set before me.

Help me to be aware of the needs of others

and to be prepared to give of myself to help them.



"Dear children, let us not love with words or tongue but with actions and in truth."



There are some rhododendron bushes in the garden in front of the Kirk Centre which have been putting on a great show this Spring. I have stood and soaked in their beauty.

Nothing in a flower book can compare with the impact of the real thing at its very best.

Christians can talk about their faith and following Jesus, but nothing compares with a life which demonstrates love in all its dealings with others. Such a life is a genuine expression of God's love, and is something which people who see it will delight in.

Lord, let me never be afraid to reach out to others in love.

Help me to radiate love in my life,

and so to give people a glimpse of your Kingdom.

Now walk round the back of the church, where panel 4 is on the back door.



"This then is how we know that we belong to the truth, and how we set our hearts at rest in his presence whenever our hearts condemn us. For God is greater than our hearts, and he knows


everything."
