

The current Bible passage is Psalm 8, which begins "O Lord, our Lord, how majestic is your name in all the earth!" It reminds us of the wonder of God and his creation, and of our privileged position within that creation, which brings responsibility. The Bible translation used is


Centuries after this psalm was written, Jesus said that we all need to be like children if we are to enter God's kingdom. We too need to be wholehearted and totally trusting.

"When I consider your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place, what is man that you are mindful of him, the son of man that you care for him?



If you've ever been in a "dark sky" area, or even in the depths of the country at night, you will have a sense of the millions of stars out there in the vast canopy of space. You will also appreciate just how small a human being is in God's great creation. Perhaps David wrote this psalm when he was a shepherd, out on the hills near Bethlehem one night.

David knew that God had created all this wonder in the night sky, and was staggered to think that God could be bothered to look after each insignificant human being. Yet David knew that God did care for him and watch over him, and would continue to do so.

Lord, we are in awe of your creation.


We are overwhelmed that you care
