

Going Fishing?

My mother's side of the family are from Fraserburgh, and so it will come as no surprise for you to learn that my Grandfather and several of my uncles were professional fishermen. They made their living in the cold waters of the North Sea, sailing out in the small boats known as 'drifters' in search of the 'silver darlings' – their name for the precious shoals of herring.

My first experience of fishing was when my Uncle Freddie took me and another lad out in a rowing boat in the waters off Broadsea village, with some fishing line and a tin of bait. I can still remember the thrill of catching my first fish, a good sized codling, which Uncle Freddie helped me haul, wriggling and thrashing, into the boat. I bore it home proudly, and that evening we had delicious fish and potato soup for tea.

Perhaps it was because a number of Jesus first followers were fisherman that he often used fishing as a metaphor for his ministry and mission. **"Come and follow me"**, he said, **"and I will make you fishers of men."**

We hear him use this phrase in chapter 5 of Luke's Gospel. We are told that he was trying to teach the people, but the crowd was so big he had to ask a couple of fishermen if he could sit in their boat and push out from the shore.

When he had finished teaching he suggested that they push out further, into deeper water, and cast their nets over the side. They did so rather reluctantly, but the moment their nets went

over the side they caught so many fish that they started to break. So they called for help and another boat came and joined them, and they landed the catch together. It was only after this that Jesus invited them to follow him, and they responded without hesitation.

We were discussing this passage at a church leaders prayer time earlier this year, and someone shared that this was a really good image for different churches working together. We all have a common purpose, which is to be 'fishers of men', but we won't catch anything if we stay safe by the shore. Instead we need to launch our boats out into the deeper water and cast out our nets. And, the more we pool our resources, the greater will be our success.

A great example of this principle in action is something called **'Toastie Tuesdays'**. Every Tuesday lunch time, a bunch of volunteers made up of people from several local churches, work together to supply a simple lunch to the pupils of a local high school. As a result, an average of 150 students per week are being given a very positive impression of what church is all about – something which will bear fruit in the years to come.

Is this just a one off? By no means. This is the future of the church in South East Edinburgh.

The younger son took his money and went to another country.




Then his money ran out and there was a famine.

God's Amazing Grace in My Life (Jean)

Following John's death in 2005, I hit the lowest point in my life. I felt literally as if I had been cut down the middle. I thought I had no point to living. After many tearful prayers God showed me what I could do by looking around me for those in similar situations. I saw foreign students attending our church who were far from home and I felt God nudging me to open my home to them. Instantly my focus moved and Sunday lunches became a different way of life as we stayed together to attend evening service. I worried about my cooking skills being good enough. It seemed quantity was the main criteria! Suddenly I had new friends, who were really close and important to me, especially a Rwandan refugee who had just arrived in Aberdeen to study medicine and a Nigerian studying pharmacy. Having once harboured thoughts of being a missionary nurse I felt a kinship. Later I was privileged to attend Maxwell's phd graduation and Simon's in medicine.

As the years passed I asked many questions to learn more of their families and geography. Rwanda in particular was current because of the awful genocide. It is a land of a 1000 hills, being volcanic. Wondering how anyone could forgive such atrocities where families were torn apart neighbours and colleagues no longer trusted was difficult to fathom. Simon asked me if I should like to visit with him and Jane his wife. Being retired I felt I had no talents to offer, but was quickly told of cooking decorating driving, gardening nursing raising 3 children. I went aged 75, flying into Entebbe, Uganda [English speaking] with them for a 3 day holiday before going on to Rwanda there for 16 days.

Becoming involved as a trustee for a charity which Simon started, named the Rwandan school village project [rsvp], has been wonderfully satisfying, exciting, challenging and amazing. God is good! All the time! God is good! He answered my prayers. I felt reborn with my focus on others and their living conditions, diseases, politics, nutrition, health provision [where any] education and opportunities, hospitals run by a Dr were opened to me and drugs, equipment also well used from the west with no instructions. I saw only one Oxygen cylinder in that Hospital +

Everyone differs in what and how to change and adapt but what is needed is prayer. Words are useful though not essential. We would be the poorer if David had not done so. This was completely new and felt violent as I poured out my feelings.

The family had gone to their homes, which emphasised my change. I hated going out in case I met anyone who might sympathise, when I might start to cry. How we hate showing weakness/lack of control. Fortunately God can use us then. Looking at church members I saw some foreign students, far from their homes, without normal comforts, which are often taken for granted. Suddenly I felt drawn to offering Sunday lunch after Church. They seemed to get quite at home and relaxed until nearly tea time, when we all went back for the evening service. I don't rate myself a brilliant cook but they seemed happy.

Then I realised that God had indeed answered my prayers and blessed me abundantly in many ways with friendships struck which remain. As Africans say God is good. All the time. God is good!

Polio. Around The World

Some good news.

In the whole of 2021, there were just 5 wild poliovirus (WPV) cases in the world. 4 in Afghanistan and 1 in Pakistan. However, as of 28 January two of them will have occurred more than 12 months ago, so in the last 12 months there have been only 3 cases, all in one province of northern Afghanistan and 2 of them in one household. In 1985 when the Polio-Plus campaign began there were nearly 350,000 Wild Polio Virus (WPV) cases worldwide, 84% of them in Africa, the Middle East and South-East Asia. The fact that only 2 households worldwide have been affected by WPV is a demonstration of the success of the polio eradication campaign which was started by Rotary, but it is not yet over. Circulating vaccine derived poliovirus (cVDVP) is concerning, with 2,088 cases in the last 3 years, almost 70% in Sub-Saharan Africa where the recent situation in Nigeria has been particularly worrying. The organisation of mass immunisation campaigns in these countries has been challenging for political and social reasons, including armed conflict and the Covid-19 pandemic, but as you will of course realise, continued vaccination is the key to controlling all outbreaks of both WPV and cVDVP.

The Covid pandemic is understandably centre stage for the world, taking attention away from the polio eradication campaign. However, the effectiveness of the PolioPlus programme in delivering not just polio vaccine, but other essential vaccines, in the most difficult circumstances – the Plus in PolioPlus – is becoming the model for delivery of Covid vaccines as well.

Watch out for the crocuses coming up at the entrance to the Kirk Yard and the two crosses in front of the Church. You may see other areas around Scotland where Rotarian's have planted crocuses - Burdiehouse Park and just beyond Liberton Medical Practice. These were planted a few years ago by Rotarians and is the symbol of End Polio Now.




