

When I survey the wondrous cross, Praise the name of Jesus!


For God so loved the world, How deep the Father's love!

A story that makes sense of life

One of the greatest needs we all struggle with as human beings is the need for meaning in life. This was one of the things that, in my early twenties, drew me back to the Christian Faith. In particular, a couple of the promises Jesus once made –

I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry. Whoever believes in me will never go thirsty. (John 6.35)

He made these promises at a time when the people, very impressed after the miracle of the feeding of the 5,000, were flocking after him for more food to fill their stomachs. But his words echo the words spoken by Moses, who, after the people had eaten their fill of manna, said -

Man does not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God (Deuteronomy 8.3)

Where, then, can we find this bread? We find it in the words of the Bible. The Bible contains the story that makes sense of life and at the heart of this story is Jesus.

On the First of May, 2022, we will be embarking on a six week journey of exploration through the Bible, focusing on six great themes which provide the answers to some of life's big questions –

'Origins' – our human desire for meaning

'Exodus' – our human quest for freedom

'Exile' – our human cry for peace 'Messiah' – our human need for love

'Spirit' – our human thirst for community

'Hope' – our human longing for home

It's a journey we will be making together, and it is my hope that you will join us. We will be basing our journey on a book by Andrew Ollerton – 'The Bible, - A story that makes sense of life', and there will be different ways for you to join in.

Firstly, you can buy the book and read it yourself. It is divided up into 6 weeks worth of short chapters which can be read on a daily basis. (see below for details*)

Secondly, you can join the 'Bible Course', based on the book, which Jared Hay will be running on zoom on Monday evenings, beginning Monday 2nd May

Thirdly, you can discuss what you have been learning about the Bible at one of our many Link groups (see magazine for details)

Fourthly, you can follow what we've been learning Sunday by Sunday, as our morning services will review the theme of the week that has passed.

Whichever way you are able to join us, I can promise you an exciting journey. It is possible to learn a lot on our own, but it's a lot more fun when we do it together.

Cod's Amazing Crace in My Life (Kay)

One of my favourite hymns is the very well known song Amazing Grace. I love singing the original version as well as the more recent worship tunes and words. The word "grace" I discovered appears six times in the original version and it means the unmerited, unearned love and favour of God. He is kind and wants the best for us and I am reminded of the abundance of grace time and time again that God has shown to me throughout my life and continues to do so.

There is a saying which goes "you just couldn't make that up!" as we tell others about situations and experiences that we have gone through in our lives, especially when we see God's grace and goodness at work. Here is my version.

I was raised in Gracemount and after attending the local Primary, then Gracemount and Liberton High Schools, went on to study in Edinburgh and qualified as a P.E. teacher in 1977. As a youngster I attended Sunday School and Band of Hope meetings held in Gracemount Primary and it was there at the age of ten that I put my trust in Christ. You could say at this point I became aware of God's love and

grace in my life. As a teenager and adult I attended and was involved at the Edinburgh City Mission in the Inch and it was there I met Alan and we married in 1978 and then moved to Berwick –upon- Tweed where Alan studied for 3 years at Lebanon Bible College and where both our children were born. This was another season of God's grace as He provided for us in so many ways.

In 1984 we moved to Fife to work for a Baptist Church and where I taught P.E. for nearly 30 years. We were able to return to Edinburgh 12 years ago, or back "home" as we like to call it, little realising that God would lead us full circle, both geographically and spiritually back to where it all began for both of us – living again in the South of Edinburgh and becoming members of Gracemount Church. Four years ago I felt a strong call to serve God in a deeper way and applied for the OLM Ministry with the Church of Scotland and was recently ordained to serve within the charge of Gracemount linked with Liberton Kirk. The saying "you couldn't make it up" comes to mind often as we worship there every week in Gracemount school hall all these years later! We are amazed at God's goodness and grace and the way He has led us throughout the years and for His provision and outworking of His purposes in our lives.


Tesus' tomb had been sealed with a large stone. Very early Sunday morning, some of Jesus' friends went to put spices on his body.












They saw the tomb was empty and only the cloths that Jesus' body had been wrapped in lying there. So they went back to the others.



GOOD FRIDAY (15th April)

The day begins for us outside Liberton Kirk at 10 o'clock, when we set off on a **Prayer Walk**, meeting up with Liberton Northfield and St. Gregory's at Liberton Northfield Church and then walking down to Morrisons supermarket in Gilmerton Road. On the walk we stop at various points on the way where people gather (schools, residential homes etc.) to pray for our community.



In the car park at Morrisons at 11 o'clock we hold an **Open-air Service.** We are joined for this by others who have walked from Moredun (Tron Kirk, St. Barnabas' and St. John Vianney's) and from Gracemount (St. Catherine's and Gracemount Church), and by others not able to do the walk but wanting to be part of the service. Morrisons café is a







good place for after-service refreshments!

On Good Friday afternoon there is a **Joint Service at Gracemount High School** at 3 o'clock, when all the SEECAT churches meet again, remembering just what the cross means for us all. The speaker this year will be Very Rev. Dr. Susan Brown, Convenor of the Church of Scotland **SEECAT** Faith Impact Forum and a former Moderator. There is a cup of tea after the service, which gives us a chance to chat with people from the

other churches we don't see very often.

If you are unable to be at either of these events, there will be a **Service of Worship** and **Reflection** at 7.30pm in Liberton Kirk.

Three opportunities to rejoice together that Jesus has risen from the dead!



Eco Church - What do you actually do?

That phrase was the theme of a watchnight service many years ago delivered dramatically as John Cameron (our previous minister) marched out of the church at midnight into the dark-no blessing, no music. A full church left in stunned silence – and to search their conscience.

If there is a problem, what do you actually do? Easy to think, someone else will solve it or it will go away. Cop 26 is already 'something that happened in Glasgow last year.' Yes, we acknowledged that there are some problems but surely the governments of the world will sort it and the problem whatever it is, will go away. Governments are people. We are the people. We are the ones who need to act. Climate change has happened and it's not going away.

Recently great swathes of trees were demolished during a storm in the John Muir Country Park in East Lothian. Talking to an official I flippantly said, well the Queen will be happy if we replace them for her millennium tree project. I was stunned by the reply that they will probably not be replaced given that a) the sandy soil will not stand up to holding the trees in the increasing number of fierce storms and b) by the time the trees are mature that part of the coast will be under water anyway from the rising sea levels, directly due to climate change.

It is not just governments who can make a change it is every one of us. We have the ability to protect God's creation. Us. Every one of us with a conscience.

Already Liberton Kirk has made many very effective improvements such as simply changing all the light bulbs to LED ones, an outlay that in time saves money and uses less electricity. All churches are being encouraged to become eco congregations and we at Liberton are considering registering as an Eco Congregation.

Initially we look at the various aspects, the buildings and their use, the finances, the land, youth work, education, mission, personal lifestyle, community, worship etc (see the website Eco Congregations Scotland for guidance) to see what has already been done, then what could be done to improve our profile and to work out a time-scale for possibilities.

I have already met with 2 committees and have been struck by how few people expect to have to do everything in connection with running the church! I would appreciate if anyone would get in touch with me to help, whether a member or not, to do the survey, to offer suggestions which maybe have not been thought of, just to move this forward and encourage everyone we know to become much, much more aware that if we do nothing our beautiful world will be damaged irreparably.

Accounts 2021

The signed and audited accounts for 2021 will be available on the Welcome Desks in the Church

For further information I have attached two sheets of analysis of the figures given on page 6 of the accounts.

One relates to Unrestricted Funds – the most important one being the General Fund (see below). This shows our offerings as well as the costs of our staff and other expenses incurred in the running and maintenance of our Church, the halls and the activities which are held in them.

The second is a breakdown of the income and expenditure of the Restricted Funds (for which a specific purpose has been stated by the donor).

General Fund

In 2021 (as in 2020) offerings remained at a similar level as in a normal year. The effort to maintain a normal level of giving by members of Liberton Kirk, in what have been difficult years, is much appreciated. In the last two years the support of the Job Retention Scheme (2021: £11,662) towards the salaries of locally paid staff has helped at a time when our halls (and cafe) have been closed for several months (2021:hall rents £6,781 as opposed to approx. £15,000 in a normal year). Also in 2021 on the National Giving Day the sum of £4,774 was received.

Our Ministries and Mission contribution to '121' remained at a similar level to previous years, but represented 50% of income in 2021 as opposed to 45% previously. In 2021 there was no annual increase to the salaries of our locally paid staff (this was in line with that taken on the ministers' stipend) and the overall cost of these salaries was less due to the resignation of our Youth Worker at the end of August and also the Facilities Manager at the end of November. Other costs of our halls and church buildings were lower as a result of their closure for some months.


As a result of all the financial support mentioned above, the General Fund had a surplus of £30,527 which has been transferred to Reserves to meet future deficits.

Seaton Legacy

In order to run Zoom services from the church various items of equipment have been purchased to enable this to happen which has incurred significant cost and has been met from the legacy left by Christine Seaton. The financial impact of this is being spread over four years and will appear under the heading of depreciation over that period.

Legacies - received 2021

A legacy of £90,000 has been received from Mrs Morag Fowlie's estate while an-



other legacy of £20,000 has been received from Dr Catherine Strang. These legacies, in line with Kirk Session policy, will be allocated to Mission and Fabric projects in the future.

The year ahead - 2022

In January 2022 salaries were increased by 2% (in line with the percentage approved by the General Assembly for ministers' stipends) while our contribution to the central Ministries and Mission Fund is not increasing further. Liberton Kirk will be impacted by the increase in costs of supplies. However, due to being part of a group contract for the supply of gas and electricity, we are protected against a rise in costs until March 2024. The salary cost of a Youth Worker will not impact the General Fund as Emily's costs, who is acting up, are being met by donations from individuals, the Gemmell Legacy dividends and the balance being contributed by the Kirkgate Trust.

It is expected that this year will be a more normal year with, hopefully, hall income increasing once again. With the cushion of last year's surplus any shortfall this year can be met. However, it is hoped that our income will be sufficient to meet our costs on an ongoing basis. The support of Liberton Kirk's members, both financially and spiritually, in the past few difficult years and on into the future is encouraging and appreciated. As a church family, and with God's help, we can face the uncertain times ahead.

Bunessan

(Child in The Manger / Morning has Broken)

Bunessan is the English version of the Gaelic placename Bun Easain, which means "at the foot of the little waterfall". It is a village on the island of Mull on the road to lona. The village is situated near the home of Mary MacDonald, who composed the carol Leanabh an Aigh, translated by Lachlan MacBean into English as "Child in the Manger". Leanabh an Aigh / Child in the Manger appears in both languages as hymn 314 in CH4. The tune it was set to is described as a Gaelic or Highland melody; it may have originated in Ireland in view of its association with lona. Some years after it was written, the melody was used for the hymn Morning has Broken with words by Eleanor Farjeon, which was popularised by the singer Cat Stephens in 1971.


