

True love

I had an interesting chat with one of our long standing members the other day. She had asked me round to help plan her funeral. A strange thing to do, you may think, but something I recommend as very worthwhile, as it relieves our loved ones of the responsibility of having to make sensitive decisions at a time when they are likely to be very upset themselves

She asked that one of the readings at her service be from the book of 1 Corinthians, chapter 13. This is one of the most beautiful passages in the New Testament, as it speaks of the love that lies at the heart of our faith. She had a slight problem, however. She wanted it read in the traditional Authorised Version, but wasn't sure of the AV's use of the word 'charity' instead of 'love'.

I can understand her hesitancy. These days the word 'charity' tends to conjure up images of sponsored runs, second hand clothes shops, and media campaigns in aid of a good cause. Nothing wrong with any of these things, but that is not all there is to 'charity'. In the end we agreed to simply replace 'charity' with 'caritas' – the Latin word from which it stems

Caritas is the love that is sacrificial

and self-giving. From a Christian point of view, 1 Corinthains 13 is not just about a feeling, it's about the person who wholly embodied this feeling – a man called Jesus, who demonstrated his caritas by giving his life for the world.

Seen through this lens, 1 Corinthians takes on a deeper meaning –

Jesus is patient. Jesus is kind

Jesus is patient, Jesus is kind
Jesus does not envy, does not boast
Jesus is not rude or self-seeking.
Jesus is not easily angered.
Jesus keeps no record of wrongs.
Jesus always trusts, always protects,
always hopes, always perseveres.
Jesus never fails.

My prayer for us all, as we face a difficult winter, is that we would be gifted with Jesus' caritas, and be ready to share that gift with others.




Liberton Kirk Guild: #wearebusy!

Energy Advice and Tips:

Energy is a big worry right now. Heating through the winter is a concern for all. Here are a few ideas worth considering:

- Turn your thermostat down 1 or 2 degrees. (try 18 or even 16 degrees)
- Reduce the timed periods for heating by a few hours.
- Close the blinds and curtains earlier just as the light is fading to keep heat in.
- Use single bulb uplighter lamps instead of centre fittings with lots of bulbs.
 (uplighter types can also have a second reading lamp too.)
- Ensure that all bulbs are LED and 5 to 7 watts.
- Seal off unused/spare rooms, lowering the thermostats in them too to frost level or just above.
- Use draught excluders or old towels rolled up at the foot of doors as cold air comes in at these lower levels while the heat rises to the ceilings.
- Place tin foil behind your radiators so that all the heat produced is reflected into the room and not the walls
- Cook some hot food. The cooker will heat the kitchen a bit and the hot food will heat you.
- Wear more clothes as layers trap air and your body will heat that air and keep you warmer.

Blister Pack Recycling

A box for recycling your "blister packs" is available in the Offering House. A simple thing like recycling these can make a difference both to the environment and the charity Lil Hub & Shop. They have prevented more than a million bits of plastic from polluting our world. The money raised goes to all their projects and it is a social enterprise doing amazing work in East Lothian.



Presbytery Planning - an update

As I write this I am aware that, here in Edinburgh and West Lothian, we are coming to the final stages of the latest presbytery planning process. The final draft of the new plan will be voted on by our Presbytery on **Tuesday 15-th November**, and, if approved, will come into effect at the beginning of 2023.

The process, which began in the Autumn of 2020, has been a real test of who we are as a Church. Whenever individual churches are faced with the prospect of union and readjustment, there is always the temptation to look after their own interests over and above those of neighbouring churches. And yet our calling, as Christ's body on earth, is to look after each other too.

The plan for the churches of South East Edinburgh is that we all become one parish, served by three full time ministers and two voluntary OLMs (Ordained Local Ministers). Any other leadership we need will have to be funded locally.

While we will be united into one administrative unit, we will continue to worship in our own buildings and serve our local communities as best we can. Our Kirk Sessions are planning to meet together at **Tron Kirk on Saturday 12th November** to begin to puzzle out what this will mean in practice. In the meantime, here are some of the values we have already identified, to help us find our way forward -

- Unity built on mutual trust and good communication
- Willingness to engage together in worship, discipleship training, mission and evangelism
- Willingness to share our people and resources
- Willingness to make sacrifices for the sake of the mission of the parish as a whole
- Openness to doing things differently
- Openness to sharing ownership of new pioneering projects
- Openness to working with other denominations
- Openness to working with partner organisations

This coming year will be a year of change for the Church in South East Edinburgh. But that is not necessarily a bad thing. For more information, please get in touch.






