#### A Mother's Love

"Honour your father and your mother, so that you may live long in the land the Lord your God is giving you." (Exodus 20.12)

Every good relationship has its phrases – sayings that have been picked up over the years and invested with personal memories and meanings. One such saying in our family, said with a Yorkshire accent, is "A mother's love is constant!"

It's a line from book called 'North and South' that was screened as a drama series on TV a number of years ago. A young woman from the south of England moves to 'the north' with her father, where they fall on hard times. At the same time she, rather reluctantly, falls in love with the gruff son of a northern mill owner, and the book is about the trials and tribulations of their relationship, set against the backdrop of industrial strife.

The mill owner's wife is a humourless woman with strong views as to the suitability of the young heroine, but, in time, their relationship begins to warm. And, at one point the older woman sums up her philosophy on life with the words: "Whatever happens in life, a mother's love is constant"

And so it is. There is nothing more moving than seeing the self-

sacrificing godly love of a mother poured out on her children (and grand-children) through passing years, whatever their age. Sadly, sometimes this is not the case, (just as sometimes fathers don't live up to the ideal of fatherhood), but this does not mean that constant love is what all mothers should be aiming for.

In the Christian tradition, we are encouraged to think of the Church as 'Mother Church', something we celebrate every year on Mothering Sunday. It's a day which also gives us an opportunity to say thank you to our own mothers, for the love they have shown us throughout our lives. So, let's enjoy Mothering Sunday, a day to remind ourselves that, whether Mother Church, or our own mother or grandmother, "a mother's love is constant".

#### Telling Others the Good News

#### Just Listen

Some people think I am a natural evangelist. Not at all. But if I'm with someone I will try and have an enjoyable or worthwhile conversation.

Some of my best conversations are in the sauna. No, not that kind! The one after my swim on Friday. Saunas are interesting places. You sit in a hot box with hardly any clothes on. Should you talk or sit in silence? I don't start a conversation by saying, 'So you think it's hot in here...'

No, if it happens it goes like this: I just ask questions and show interest. 'How often do you get down here?' 'What do you do when you are not sitting in a sauna?' 'How often have you lived in Edinburgh?' Etc. But then something happens. They ask me about myself and what I do. I mention I'm involved with trypraying, 'You may have seen it on banners or buses'. 'Oh yes, I've seen that' is often the response. And then we are talking. I usually say that I became a Christian at university when I was studying Maths. I became convinced by the evidence. My life changed through discovering a relationship with Jesus. I don't use religious language. I don't get serious. I simply try to relate.

It's a time-limited conversation and ends with me saying, 'I'm cooked.'

You could try this. Pray for an opportunity. Ask questions and be genuinely interested. Use a bridge (Have you ever tried praying? Do you ever think about spiritual things?) God will give opportunities if we are prepared to take them.


























#### Song For Easter Morning

#### Take My Life and Let It Be


Frances R. Havergal (1836-1879) was the daughter of William H. Havergal, an Anglican clergyman who also wrote and composed hymns. "Take My Life and Let It Be" was written by Frances on February 4, 1874, when she was visiting a group of friends.



She later wrote: "The last night of my visit I was too happy to sleep, and passed most of the night in prayer and in renewal of my own consecration, and these little couplets formed themselves and chimed in my heart one after another, till they finished with, Ever, only, all for thee!"

The hymn is sung to various tunes, one of the most popular being Nottingham. This tune was formerly attributed to Mozart but is now generally believed to be by Wenzel Mueller (1767-1835).

#### South East Edinburgh Church of Scotland

It looks like we have a new name to get used to! At the most recent meeting of our area grouping, it was decided that the provisional name of our new parish will be South East Edinburgh Church of Scotland. While we will continue to worship in our congregations of Liberton Kirk, Liberton Northfield, Gracemount, Tron Gilmerton and Moredun and Reid Memorial, moving forward we will be governed as one parish served by a team of centrally and locally appointed leaders.

For quite some time now, we have been giving consideration to the future form of the Church of Scotland in our part of Edinburgh. This has come about in response to deliberations at the General Assembly and as part of the process of presbytery planning being undertaken by the Presbytery of Edinburgh and West Lothian. On 12<sup>th</sup> November last year, representatives of all our churches met at Tron Moredun to begin to consider how we can make the new arrangements work to our advantage, and to the advantage of all who live in our area through our key task of mission. Much thought is being given to how we can achieve a helpful balance between our local worshipping communities and the bigger picture.

Since 12th November, a range of groups with representation from all the churches involved have begun to meet to consider areas of interest, including communications, worship, mission, discipleship, youth work, pastoral care, finance and buildings. This work has been supported by the development of a covenant, which underpins the way we plan to work together to achieve the Five Marks of Mission of the Church of Scotland, namely:

- Proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom.
- Teach, baptise and nurture new believers.
- Respond to human need by loving service.
- Transform unjust structures of society, challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation.
- Strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the Earth.

While many key decisions still remain to be made covering such areas as the Basis of our Union, charity status and charity law, we are fortunate to be able to work together in an atmosphere of mutual trust and respect and a real desire to make a difference in our local communities, bringing others face to face with the good news of Jesus.

If you have any particular questions about the ongoing process of presbytery planning, John or I would be happy to speak to you.



#### **Cuild Projects**

Every three years a strategy with three annual themes is decided by the **Guild**. We are currently in the second year of our strategy "**Look Forward in Faith**" and our theme is "**Wee Seeds Big Trees**".

The Vine Trust – the Kazunzu Village of Hope (Tanzania). Working with the Vine Trust and their partners on the ground, the Guild is helping them take forward the development of a sustainable village with homes, a school, a health centre, a community hub and 40 indi-



**Beat – 'Blether with Beat' (Scotland)**. Eating disorders have a huge impact on young people and on their families. This project is helping to develop a network of young ambassadors who work in schools, colleges and universities, as well as with church congregations, the Boys' Brigade, the Girls' Brigade and school chaplains to raise awareness of the impact of eating disorders and engage people to seek help. (Amount raised from 1 June '21 - 31 December '22 - £29,426.83)

Home for Good (Scotland) is a Christian charity dedicated to finding a home for every child who needs one. (Amount raised from 1 June '21 - 31 December '22 - £35,673.86)

Pioneers – Chocolate Heaven, (South East Asia). This project is helping to build and develop a factory producing sustainable chocolate production. The project's success will be measured by: more farmers receiving fair prices and more workers experiencing regular employment which will support their families. (Amount raised FROM 1 June '21-31 December '22 - £18,056.97)

**UNIDA – 'Hear our voice!', (Brazil).** Faith in the Future' is a project at Faculdade Unida de Vitória (UNIDA), a higher education institution in Brazil, designed to empower young women through theological education. UNIDA believes in an education that can transform lives in a violently unjust Brazilian society. **(Amount raised from 1 June '21 - 31 December '22 - £12,119.13)** 

**Starchild (Uganda)** is building, with the help of the Guild, a centre where children with a range of learning disabilities - but particularly autism - can come to learn alongside their peers. In Uganda, children with learning disabilities are often hidden away and do not receive the education they should. This project tackles that stigma, supporting the children and their families and also helping to educate community leaders. (Amount raised from 1 June '21 - 31 December '22 - £26,919.76).

These amounts have been raised by all the Church of Scotland Guilds. This year the projects we have chosen are the

#### **Eco-Congregation**

#### Carbon Footprint: Measure - Reduce - Offset

The buzzwords "carbon footprint" are ever-present in the media currently; here, we introduce a Christian charity called Climate Stewards <a href="www.climatestewards.org">www.climatestewards.org</a> who can help with the key dimensions of our individual carbon footprint: how to measure it, what to do about it, and, where emissions can't be avoided, providing an easy pathway to offsetting them.

Climate Stewards is part of the *A Rocha* www.arocha.org.uk family of organisations, whose aim is to help care for God's creation. The vision of Climate Stewards is to help everyone adjust to living with lower carbon outputs and to provide support for our global neighbours as they respond to the impacts of climate change.

Climate Stewards currently works with partner projects in six countries (Ghana, Kenya, Nepal, Peru, Tanzania, Uganda). The exciting feature of their work is that, rather then simply offering a financial transaction to offset carbon outputs, they partner with trusted local community carbon initiatives. As a result their projects, which are designed by local organisations, bring benefits to health, family finances and the local environment, as well as achieving the objective of carbon mitigation.

An example project in Nepal is the provision of smokeless metal stoves in the community. Rupsi used to cook for her family on an open fire, bringing increased risk of eye and skin irritations and infections. They had to collect 120kg of firewood each week for cooking and heating. Climate Stewards partner RIDS Nepal installed a smokeless metal stove, halving Rupsi's family's firewood requirements. They now don't need to collect wood each day, leaving the children more time for education and other activities. A chimney removes harmful soot and carbon monoxide directly from their home, and the efficient burning action of the stove reduces CO<sub>2</sub> emissions by 6.5 tons each year.

The Climate Stewards carbon offsetting calculator  $\underline{\text{www.climatestewards.org/offset}}$  is easy to use and provides a direct opportunity for us to offset unavoidable carbon outputs associated with our activities. As an example, the cost of offsetting the emissions from a return train journey to London would be £1.43; a flight to the Mediterranean would cost around £15 to offset. If you've been thinking about offsetting and haven't yet found a way of doing so, feel free to give Climate Stewards a try! Even taking the first step of measuring my carbon footprint using their calculator led to some thought-provoking results.




