
Prayer for September

Joy comes in the morning

Have you noticed that it's been raining quite a bit lately? Here in Liberton, while June was unusually hot, the rest of the summer has been unusually wet.

We are early risers, and the view from our bedroom window is often wonderful to wake up to. It takes in Blackford Hill to the north, the Braids to the west and the Pentland Hills to the south, with Liberton Tower somewhere in the middle.

The Kirkyard can be even more beautiful, with its panoramic views of Edinburgh city and beyond to the Forth and Fife. There is a point at the north-east corner of the church itself, where you can see Arthur's Seat. Sometimes, when going round that corner, you can't see it at all, because much of this past summer there has been rain and low cloud. However, that does not mean that it is not still there. We know that when the clouds lift it will be there, rising up over our city again.

This is very true of our relationship with God. Most of us go through cloudy patches, where we find it difficult to see the presence of God. But He is still there. Just as we would be a bit daft to think that Arthur's Seat has actually gone away, so it would be the same if we doubted the existence of a loving, caring God, who has done everything for us, and has a plan for our lives despite the clouds and rain.

Back in March, 2020, at the very beginning of the first Covid lockdown, I was drawn to the words of these Psalms

The Lord is a refuge for the oppressed, A place of safety in times of trouble. Those who know you Lord will trust you; You do not abandon anyone who comes to you. (Psalm 9)

And

Weeping may remain for a night, But joy comes in the morning. (Psalm 30)

I don't know who you are, reading this today, or what your life is like just now. I do know that God cares for you as an individual, and wants the very best for you. I also know that our church at Liberton tries to be a loving, welcoming, caring community, and it's during those times when we are facing seemingly endless clouds that the presence in our lives of other people who have experienced similar clouds, can make all the difference. Please come and join us, so that together we may discover how to see things more clearly.


















Christian Aid Week 2023

This year Christian Aid Week ran from 13 to 20 May. I am glad to give a report on this year's efforts in the Liberton Kirk Congregation.

Donations - At the Big Brekkie Event on 13 May \pounds 705 Given in Return envelopes \pounds 2,335 Total \pounds 3.040

In addition, a large proportion of the Return Envelopes donations included Gift Aid Declarations.

From these, there should be recoverable from HMRC, in the hands of Christian Aid, a further sum of £470.

Overall, this is very slightly down on the total received in Christian Aid Week, 2022, but is indeed a very good result in the present economic circumstances.

A big thank you is sent to all who took part – to the organisers and helpers at the Big Brekkie, to all who assisted with delivery of envelopes, and receiving filled envelopes, and to all who contributed in any way.

In The Kirkyard

There is usually something to look at if you are walking round or through our peaceful Kirkyard!

The Word for Today begins on the wall of the Offering House (the small building just inside the main gate) and can then be found on the benches going round the church anti-clockwise. The Care/Pastoral Team

The Care /PastoralTeam is one of the many teams that are part of the wider organisation of the church. Each Team has its own remit. The following areas come under the remit of the Care/Pastoral Team.

"Catering for the needs of members of the church and wider community"

Care Home Services

A small team of four people have been providing monthly services to the three care homes in the parish, with occasional help from one or two others in the congregation.

We usually visit: Braid Hills on the 3rd Wednesday afternoon of the month,

Liberton Brae Nursing Home 1st Tuesday of the month

Guthrie House on the last Tuesday of the month

The services usually last up to half an hour, usually in the afternoon, and are attended by numbers ranging from 8 to 25, depending on who wishes to come and is able to do so. They are usually led on alternate months by John Young or Fiona Devoy

Home Communion


Home Communion is given to members of the congregation who are unable to attend any of the Communion Services whether they are at home or in one of the Nursing Homes.

News Extra

This is a newsletter which goes out to the housebound or Nursing Home residents keeping them in touch with all the Liberton Kirk News.

Special Communion Service

This shortened service is held 3 times a year, September, February and May. It is held at 3pm in the Anderson Hall and is a shortened Communion Service for people who are unable to sit through a normal Communion Service. The service is followed by Tea and Coffee and Fellowship. There is an open invitation to the other South East Edinburg Church of Scotland (SEECoS) churches.



Next Special Communion Service is Sunday September 10th at 3pm in the Anderson Hall.

Senior Citizens

Senior citizens, runs from September until the end of April. Currently we have approximately 80 members. The members are a mix of people from church and from the local community. along. We have had a good range of entertainers and had some afternoon teas. Usually celebrating special events such as Christmas and Burns Day. We are very grateful to SEAG for providing buses and drivers,. As with most areas in church we would benefit from a few more volunteers.

Bethany

Care Van / Care Van Donations

The Bethany Care Van goes out 364 nights of the year providing soup, hot drinks. rolls, fruit. biscuits etc to the homeless in the city. It is staffed with volunteers from churches in Edinburgh and further afield. The Liberton team of 3 go out every 2^{nd} Wednesday in the month on a rota basis. More volunteers are always needed. Volunteers must be over 18.

We would welcome any donations of warm jumpers, jackets/coats, trousers, new socks and underwear. Warm hats and gloves are also very welcome.

Night Shelter

The Night Shelter runs from 31* October until 3oth April approximately .lt is situated in The Welcome Hub at Haymarket. A team of 7 volunteers from Liberton Kirk prepare and cook a hot 2 course meal which is then delivered and served to the clients who use the Welcome Hub. Liberton Kirk provide a team that go out twice a year, usually a Saturday evening ,November and March. More volunteers are always welcome.

Street Pastors

Last year over 3000 people in Edinburgh were helped by the Street Pastors. Liberton Kirk supports two Street Pastors, Aileen Deas and Andy Macgill. They go out on patrol every four weeks.

The cookery classes on Friday afternoons are well attended. Locals can go along and learn to cook nourishing low cost meals. They then sit down to enjoy the food with their children and other neighbours..

Warm Hub

This is running on Friday afternoons 1:30pm -4pm in the Kirk Centre and includes the IT Clinic Drop in for a Tea and coffee and a chat.

Safe Families

Safe Families is a Christian organisation which provides support to families who may just need an extra hand for a short time. Training is provided.

Crossreach

Crossreach is one of the outreach branches of the Church of Scotland. They support new mums, older people and many other areas. Liberton Kirk support Crossreach, mainly by selling Christmas Cards and Calendars at Christmas time.

Bereavement Support Group

This group provides support for people who have suffered loss. It runs twice a

year usually Autumn and Spring. The group gives people a safe space to talk, to be listened to and be given support through shared experiences.

Over the course of the last few years, Covid deprived us of many events when we could enjoy the fun of being together. Thankfully we can once more organise concerts and fundraising events that draw on and create community spirit, and so you are warmly invited to the Macmillan Fundraising Afternoon Tea to be held in the Kirkgate Café on 23rd September. Why is Macmillan Cancer Support worth this effort? It is a sad truth that almost all of us will know people who have had to battle cancer. More than ever, people are surviving and thriving, but there are others who have lost the fight. My niece has had two encounters with cancer, and is now well again, while my sister died in 2017 at the age of 62 when the cancer for which she had previously been treated returned and spread. There are many families across the country in a similar situation.

Such families face a whole range of challenges. Emotions feel like a roller-coaster ride, fearful of what is to come yet trying to enjoy every moment of life. And there are many practical or financial pressures as daily life gets reorganised around treatments and recovery. It is not surprising that people feel the need of outside help. Macmillan Cancer Support is there for just these kinds of needs. While Macmillan is probably best known for its nurses, specially trained in palliative and end of life care, it also offers a wide range of practical and emotional support for the whole family. Two Questions from the World Mission Team

Have you read the Bible recently?

If the answer is "no" it is unlikely to be because you don't have one at home and it is impossible to get hold of one in the English language! In bookshops and libraries, Bible Gateway on the internet,



Bible verses on church notice boards or lying on the benches in Liberton Kirkyard – if you want to read it, you can – and that's a privilege!

It's not the same for millions of people around the world. Bibles are just not available in the language they are most familiar with – the language that speaks to their hearts – their "heart language". In addition, in some countries the production and distribution of Bibles is restricted, in others there is a shortage of paper, and in others the literacy levels are low and the electricity to power audio Bibles is inadequate. People are longing to read God's Word and they can't.

This is where the Scottish Bible Society comes in – one of the charities Liberton Kirk supports through its World Mission Team. Working with Bible Societies in other countries, and with local churches and organisations, they support the translation of the Bible into "heart languages", the production of print and audio Bibles and the provision of literacy classes, which have the added bonus of empowering people, particularly women, in their communities.

Do you worry about children round the world?

How many children are there who are traumatised by what life has thrown at them? Children who have never known a country at peace, or who have never known any home but a refugee camp, for example. Trauma Healing programmes based on the Bible are making a difference in many places such as Ukraine, Sri Lanka and Iraq. The Scottish Bible Society is supporting the provision of these programmes through local churches and Christian schools as well as on-line.

Please support the events run by the World Mission Team from time to time which raise money for a number of projects around the world, including those sponsored by the Scottish Bible Society.

Covid Memorial for South East Edinburgh

John's vision for this planned memorial is given in his comment "The pandemic impacted many different people in different ways, and we want to provide a quiet place of remembrance, especially for those who are still processing the loss of loved ones – both near and far." The memorial will be in a spot beside the main path through the Kirkyard to Liberton Cemetery and Liberton Brae, close to the cairn (see artist's impression below).

The oval granite memorial will remember the wide range of suffering during the pandemic as well as those who died. It is hoped that it will be unveiled on Sunday, 12th May, 2024, close to the first anniversary of the official close of the pandemic. Whilst those who died will not be remembered by name on the memorial itself, it will be possible for relatives to have their loved ones' names inscribed on brass plaques on the nearby benches. In future years a short service of remembrance for those who died will be held in early May.

Anyone may contribute to the cost of the memorial corner on Liberton Kirk's Covid Memorial Just Giving page. Alternatively there are gift envelopes available from the Kirk or Kirk Centre or you can contact the Treasurer (e-mail treasurer@libertonkirk.net) for other ways of giving. Any surplus received will be given to the care homes run by CrossReach (Church of Scotland), which, like all care homes, had such a difficult time throughout the pandemic.






