Our future unity will be a matter of trust

The thread of 'friendship' can be traced throughout the Bible, but it comes to the fore in the words of Jesus. One of the most significant things he said, particularly when it comes to his church, is 'I have called you friends' (John 15.15).

The phrase 'Dear Friends', occurs 23 times in the New Testament. It's a term of affection, implying the existence of a relationship based on trust. Probably the best known occurrence is in the first letter of John – a passage often read at weddings...

Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. (1 John 4.7)

It has been our experience over the years in South East Edinburgh, that unity between different churches cannot be engineered by legal documents and structural changes. For unity to work, it has to be real, and for it to be real, it has to be built on the trust generated by true and lasting friendships.

It was with this in mind that the small steering group which has been meeting regularly over the past 3 years, (comprising representatives from all the local churches), has agreed that our relationship with each other should be 'covenantal'. In other words, it should be based on trust, as expressed in a 'covenant document' to which we have all committed ourselves (**see page s 14 and 15**).

As you can see, central to the covenant is our commitment to meet regularly together, for we know it's only when we spend time together that true friendships can develop. One such gatherings is going to take place later this month, on Saturday 18th November at the Faith Mission Auditorium. This will be our Annual Conference, to which people from all our churches are invited, including you.

We hope to spend the morning together discussing mission, inspired by Rt. Rev. Martin Fair. We will also celebrate communion together followed by a buffet lunch. But, most importantly, we will be making new friends, and getting to know each other better, as well as the challenges facing our different churches.

Saturday 18th November will be our first real opportunity to meet together as one church, and lay the foundations of trust for the joint future that awaits us. Please don't miss it.

Sharing The Good News

Once a month at Liberton Kirk we host something called Messy Church. This is a church service that, like the name suggests, can get a bit messy. We start the afternoon off with some crafts and activities related to the theme of that month. We have made lots of different things over the years ranging from pet rocks to wells made of cake, we've even built giant whales that you can climb inside. If the weather is good, we play outside in the garden where we can play in the sand pit, join in with some games or just spend a bit of time outside.



We then move to a short service where we sing songs, dance, pray, celebrate birthdays and learn a bit more about Jesus and his love for us.

After all that we sit down for a family meal, often a hot meal but occasionally finger food if the weather is nice. We have a team of volunteers who work away in the kitchen, while we are making mess in the recreation hall, preparing yummy food for us to devour. Meal time is always fun, we get to sit and discuss what we have just heard, hear what everyone has been up to and of course eat all the food....and the cakes, so



many cakes!

We have been running Messy Church at Liberton for 12 years, and throughout that time we have seen many families come through our doors. Some of these families are local to us, some are visiting, some families have come to us through our Summer Holiday Club, some heard about us through the Toddler Group, some attend church on Sun-

days, some don't. All ages are welcome, from the really tiny babies all the way up to the more mature folk out there. All we ask is that children bring an adult and adults bring a kid!

We have had a large team of volunteers help us make crafts, play games, cook for us, build with us, eat with us and share in God's glory over the past 12 years. Some of our current team have been with us from the start. We've changed how we do things over the years: changed which rooms we worship in, split to smaller dinner tables due a pandemic, no longer put birthday candles on the birthday cake (also due to a pandemic) but the idea behind it is still the same: learning about Jesus, having fun, and making friends.

We meet on the last Saturday of each month at 4pm in the Kirk Centre and we aim to finish by 6pm. We do not change entry but if you are able to give a donation to wards the cost of food then we do appreciate it.





Revised Covenant (a basis for ongoing unity)

For this is what the Lord, the God of Israel, says: 'The jar of flour will not be used up and the jug of oil will not run dry until the day the Lord sends rain on the land.' (1 Kings 17:14)

We, as leaders and members of the Parish of South East Edinburgh make the following covenant...

- To consider ourselves as one Church part of Christ's body in South East Edinburgh, acknowledging him as our Saviour and Lord.
 - To balance the need for vibrant centres of worship and mission in each of our recognised communities, with the need to share our people and resources for the benefit of the Church's mission to the parish as a whole.
 - To work together in implementing the Five Marks of Mission of the Church of Scotland.

We will do this guided by the following values...

- Unity built on mutual trust and good communication
- Willingness to engage together in worship, discipleship training, mission and evangelism
- Willingness to share our people and resources
- Willingness to make sacrifices for the sake of the mission of the parish as a whole
- Openness to doing things differently
- Openness to sharing ownership of new pioneering projects
- Openness to working with other church denominations Openness to working with partner organisation

We commit to developing and maintaining our unity and missional purpose through...

Balancing centralised and local leadership

- We recognise the importance of maintaining distinct local worshipping communities, each with their own recognised leader and mission base Local worshipping communities will have the final say in the appointment of their own leader
- Local worshipping communities will retain their name, identity, and eldership under the leadership of a Local Eldership Team
- Each local eldership team will be administered by a Local Eldership Team Clerk
- The parish as a whole will be led by the United Kirk Session (Trustees), made up of a balance of elders from each Local Eldership Team on a

rotational basis as well as all ministers, deacons, and other representatives as required

All ministers and deacons will be expected to commit a portion of their time for the service of the parish as a whole, taking into account the different skillsets required to serve the needs and requirements of the area (e.g. training programmes, outreach events, schools work, community initiatives, joint services, etc.)

No big decisions will be made by the Parish-wide Kirk Session without due consultation with Local Eldership Teams

Regular Meetings

The United Kirk Session will meet at least four times a year for general decision making and to agree future aims and strategy Local ministers and deacons will meet monthly for prayer and planning Local Eldership Team Clerks will meet together at least twice a year All elders and members, ministers and deacons, and other local appointees will meet annually for worship, conference & communion

During 2022 we were looking daily at the theme of GOOD NEWS as we journeyed with Paul through his letter to the ROMANS.




The Bible passage currently on view in the Kirkyard is Ephesians chapter 1, verses 3-14. Start at the Offering House, where there is a notice on the wall near the
