

A time for hope

The best definition of hope I've ever come across is this:

"Hope is what's left when all else has failed"

Hope is a powerful emotion. A couple of months ago, it spurred thousands of Scots to buy tickets for the Euros. Throughout July and August it is what encouraged so many of us to sit with our eyes glued to the Paris Olympics, whether it was the diving, the skateboarding, the heptathlon or the tennis!

On a more serious note, however, as I write these words I'm aware that there's a real shortage of hope in our world just now. We are worried about our futures, about our finances, and about the state of our Health Service. An awful lot of people are feeling fed up and trapped in circumstances that look unlikely to change, and when that happens, it's easy to look for someone to blame – be they asylum seekers or, more simply, those who just appear different.

Of course, looking for someone to blame doesn't usually solve much, and it makes us more susceptible to those who are quick to offer simple solutions to complex problems. Here at Liberton Kirk, offering simple solutions is something we try to avoid. Instead we offer the opportunity to be part of a community, where none of us are perfect, but where we try to listen to, share in, and understand each other's fears and concerns, and to help and support each other whenever we can.

Why do we do this? Because we all share in a common hope. Not hope for hope's sake, but hope in a real person – someone who can and does make a difference. Someone whose coming was predicted thousands of years ago in these famous words...

"Here is my servant, whom I have chosen, the one I love in whom I delight. I will put my Spirit in him and he will proclaim justice to the nations... In his name the nations will put their hope" (Matthew 12.18, 21)

Liberton Kirk is a community united by our common faith in Jesus. And, if you are looking for someone to place your hopes in, we'd love you to come along and join us, as each week we celebrate his presence among us and learn more about the greatness of his love.

WHAT IS SEECOS?

Many of you will be reading this magazine because it dropped through your letter box. That's because you live in the area served by Liberton Kirk.



Since the end of March this year Liberton Kirk is part of a much bigger parish area within the Church of Scotland called **SEECOS**, which stands for "South East Edinburgh Church of Scotland". It includes Gracemount, Burdiehouse, Gilmerton, Moredun and the Inch as well as Liberton.

The other churches within that area are:

- Liberton Northfield, at the corner of Gilmerton Road and Mount Vernon Road
- **Tron Kirk (Gilmerton & Moredun)** at the Hub, Ravenscroft Street, in Gilmerton and at Craigour Gardens in Moredun
- **Gracemount Church**, currently meeting in Gracemount Primary School.

We've been worshipping and working with these churches for many years, but this new relationship gives us the opportunity to draw even closer. We can focus our prayers and our action on areas of need, and share our resources.

It's early days in this new set-up; but if you want to find out how we are getting on, there's a website, <u>www.seecos.org.uk</u>, and a quarterly newsletter (next issue in mid-September) called **Heartbeat** which is on the website, or in print, in and around the churches and their communities.

In the Kirkyard

You are welcome to explore our lovely peaceful outdoor space, and to sit for a while on any of the benches. There is work being done on the church stonework, so do take care around scaffolding or barriers. Feel free to walk on the grass, where there are interesting gravestones, but take care if it is damp and slippery.



The Kirkyard is open from 8am to 5pm (extended during July and August to 8pm).



The Covid Memorial was dedicated in May this year, to remember those who died and all those who suffered during the pandemic, and there are two new benches beside it.

Together with the cairn this forms a quiet corner near the church tower for pausing and remembering people and events in our lives.



There is usually something to look at and read if you are walking in the Kirkyard. *The Word for Today* sets out, in several stages, a short passage from the Bible, exploring what it says to us today. It begins on the wall of the Offering House (the small building just inside the main gate) and can then be found on the benches



going round the church anti-clockwise. During July and August each year it takes the form of a Peace Pathway.

The Offering House itself has a space for collections for the Food Bank, Fresh Start, and bottle tops. It also has a history corner, with information about its own history, and some leaflets about the Kirk and Kirkyard, together with a reference book giving the gravestone inscriptions.

There are also general leaflets and the current church magazine to take away if you wish, and there is usually a display about one particular part of Liberton Kirk life. The Offering House is open during the opening hours of the Kirkyard.



Harvest Thanksaiving

On the last Sunday in September (29th) we will be giving thanks for our plentiful food and drink, and there are two opportunities for us to give to others who don't have as much as we do.

Dried and tinned foods can be brought to church on Harvest Sunday 29th, or left in the marked boxes in the Offering House during the previous week.

These will be distributed to those in need through local charities.

Alternatively (or as well as this) we can support Self Help Africa, a charity which works with local people in fourteen African countries to enable them to be self-sufficient. The World Food Programme esti-



mated that by the end of August this year, 49.5 million people could be going hungry in West and Central Africa. S.H.A. helps by training in farming methods, storage and diversification, encouraging co-operative working, empowering rural communities to feed their families despite climate change and economic instability. Have a look at their website www.selfhelpafrica.org You can give in one of two ways (and please Gift Aid your donation if you are able) (1) on the website, under "Support Us", then "Harvest Appeal", where you can enter the name of the church, or (2) in a donation envelope obtainable from

Blythswood Shoe Boxes 2024

It is that time of year again when we start thinking about the Blythswood Shoebox Appeal, and the preparation of the shoe boxes. We are confident that, as in previous years, we will have a great response from everyone.

Each person who receives a box filled with gifts feels very special, and knows that someone filled it with gifts (including a hat and scarf, toothpaste and toothbrush, a small toy and

some soap) which bring sunshine, laughter and colour into the children's lives. The shoe boxes will be given to families who have to make a choice between buying either food or fuel at Christmas, and where buying presents is not the greatest priority. A lot of these families live in houses with no running water, electricity or heating, and have to live in one or two rooms.

There will also be a box in the halls for any spare wool you may have, and patterns for the hats and toys.

As well as enjoying the company, the chat and the scenery we also intentionally include prayer, listening and silence (from humans) and perhaps share any reflections among the group. Finishing at the Balm Well in the grounds of the Toby Carvery, there will be a short symbolic act of worship with the well water there for the Season of Creation.

This route is suitable for people who walk or exercise regularly, 30 mins per day of brisk walking that makes you feel a bit warmer and breathe a bit faster is recommended for most people, if you are not already doing this, then that will be a good start to preparations for our pilgrimage (and good health).

In addition, if you have not walked 6 miles in the past 6 months then it would be a good idea to do a 3 mile walk before our pilgrimage to make sure your shoes are still comfy. These preparatory walks will add to the pleasure of the season.

Folk who prefer to sit or have a gentle stroll are welcome to join us at the Well, Straiton Pond Local Nature Reserve or Burdiehouse Burn Local Nature Reserve. However, be aware our timings will not be precise because pilgrims never know what they will encounter on the way!

Church Records available on line

The moment the Church of Scotland defied King Charles I is among a vast number of historical documents now available to view on the ScotlandsPeople website www.ScotlandsPeople.gov.uk

As part of a wider release of almost 4,000 volumes of church court records, National Records of Scotland (NRS) has added papers from the church's governing court, the General Assembly, for the first time.

This includes the minutes of the meeting held in Glasgow in November 1638 when delegates representing Scotland rejected the monarch's rules for worship.

NRS archivist Jessica Evershed said: "The 1638 meeting of the General Assembly is a turning point in Scottish history. It sees the ministers disobey the King to remove the bishops and the new common prayer book he had introduced.

"As part of the wider Covenanters' movement, this led to 50 years of war and upheaval.

"This is one item among the church court records available on ScotlandsPeople. The latest release includes approximately 300,000 digitised images of mostly handwritten historical records dating from the 1500s to 1900.

"These records are a treasure trove for professional historians and amateurs working on their family tree. The records of local church courts contain details of parish work such as grants for the poor, mediating family disputes, payments for services and issuing punishments for minor offences."

The Revd Fiona Smith, Principal Clerk of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, said: "I am delighted that National Records of Scotland are making further Church of Scotland records available in a digitised format, providing a unique window into the history of Scotland itself, as well as aspects of daily life in our parishes, unfolding over the course of hundreds of years.

ScotlandsPeople is run by National Records of Scotland. It offers access to a wide range of official records including births, deaths, marriages and census records from the 16th century to modern times. Modern records are restricted but older records can be searched free of charge; but viewed online on payment of a fee.

An Introduction to the Gospel of Matthew

This month we turn to the New Testament and look at Matthew, the first of the gospels. Later linked in name to the Apostle Matthew, it is generally believed that the anonymous Gospel author used Mark's Gospel as a basis and then added other material that had become available

Matthew, in writing for Jews, sets out to prove that Jesus is the true Messiah. He connects Jesus' birth, life death and resurrection with the Old Testament Scriptures. In fact, he quotes the Old Testament more than any other New Testament author.



This is reflected in the opening genealogy which traces Jesus back to Abraham; in his use of the terms *kingdom of heaven* and *Father in heaven*, reflecting a Jewish reluctance to use God's name; and in the way he portrays Jesus as the *Son of David*.

The whole gospel is structured around five blocks of teaching (chapters 5-7; 10; 13; 18; 24-25). This fivefold division reflects the structure of the Pentateuch (the first five books of the Old Testament).

Matthew provides a comprehensive context by which we see all God's creation and salvation completed in Jesus, and all parts of our lives (work, family, friends and future) completed in Him. At the end of his gospel, Matthew records Jesus' commission to His disciples share this good news, promising to be with them:

'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to Me. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely, I am with you always, to the very end of the age.' (28:vv18-20) Reprinted from "Parish Pump"/news
