



All of them evoked memories, and, with the memories, a mixture of feelings – both happy and sad.

It's not just old photos that have the power to do this to us. We hear a snatch of a familiar song, and all the memories and feelings associated with it resurface as if it were yesterday. That's why ministers have to be very careful when it comes to choosing hymns - woe betide anyone who dares to change the words.

Something else that can have a similar impact is a family tradition, and this applies to the church as much as to individual families. This is one of the reasons why we all love Christmas (even if we pretend not to!), and we all look forward to celebrating it together at special events and in special ways. It's good to repeat something every year, because it helps us to remember years gone past.

There is one Sunday in November when our whole nation unites in remembrance of all those who have


lost their lives in times of war. Of course, in this case, the memories are not always good ones. Listening to people in my parent's generation sharing memories of the camaraderie of wartime Britain can sometimes give the impression that it was all great fun, but we know it wasn't.

And yet it's still good to remember. This is something we did in a big way back in 2018, as we marked the 100th year since the signing of the armistice that ended the First World War. This picture is a reminder of what the church looked like at the time, and the inset is a photo of the verse from scripture that adorned the front of the Kirk.

All of which is a reminder that remembrance lies at the heart of our faith. Every time we celebrate communion together we remember the love of God revealed in his death for us on a cross. It's good to remember – that God loved us so much that he gave his only son, what whoever believes in him might not die, but might have everlasting life.

Try the Big Read experience!

I am a terrible reader, skip reading is my thing. And that's not good when reading the Bible. And our reading of the bible is further diluted in that we stick to our favourite passages, and even those we skip read, gaining no further wisdom. We often miss so much.

In 2023 I saw the SEECAT Big Read advert, and I pondered that I probably had never read a sizeable book of the Bible non-stop in one go. The Big read offered the chance and I went along.

A dozen or so people gathered, a welcome, a coffee, a chocolate croissant. What's not to like.


Low key, no pressure to read, you can listen or participate – your choice. We're invited to pick our favourite chapter to read if we want. Leaves me wondering - do I have a favourite chapter of Mark? Maybe I should, it's the story of Jesus after all. I go for a random chapter number.

Before we start there's a prayer "for what we are about to receive make us truly thankful". Sounds more like grace at the start of a meal. Then the realisation hits—we're about to feast on living bread.

And so we commence. Out loud, line by line- no chance given to skip. We get up a rhythm, a new voice for each chapter, a variety of translations around the table keeps the mind active too.

We're at Mark chapter 10, a new voice and a different translation, and a suddenly new spin on a familiar story of James and John asking for places of honour. (it's The Message - I check later). ""Arrange it" they saidthat one of us sit on the left and the other on the right"

And so it continues almost pedestrian then suddenly we're at Peter's denial and it becomes personal, because it's no longer about Peter, but about us and our failure and our denials. Suddenly too the story ramps up – the cross is approaching.

We stand as we read the crucifixion story, so brief in Mark's Gospel, but vivid enough and it's sacred ground on this morning, it feels appropriate to take a different posture.


And Mark is brief too at the resurrection and ascension. Blink or skip read. and you could miss something important.

And so it's done, line by line out loud. An hour and three quarters. That's all.

There's a time of silence as we absorb what emotions run through our minds, anger at how someone so loving, kind and gentle could be so badly treated, there's thanks, recognition we have been on holy ground, grateful that we came and unquestionably agreement around the table that we have received.

The Bid Read is to be recommended.

And the next Big Read is on 2nd November 10am, Wilson Hall above the Café . Time well spent. Guaranteed.


With the café getting busier it has meant myself and the café board are now planning on getting our barista coffee machine upgraded to ensure you still get your lovely lattes and cappuccino.

We have had a busy few months in the Preschool and Families world.

Youth work at Liberton

There is no step-by-step guide to making a believer out of a young person, everyone has their own journey to faith and only God knows how and when we will come to know him. That being said, we do have a plan on how to reach young people in Southeast Edinburgh with the gospel and disciple the young believers we know of.

There are a few different analogies you may have heard of that help to explain the plan the method behind the madness of outreach – There's the trellis, each

event or group being a different way for people to climb up the trellis. Or maybe you've heard of the funnel/trumpet as we have a wide

outreach and slowly people move through the funnel/trumpet into closer discipleship with one another and God.

The main idea is that we start by meeting people, introducing them to us on their terms (Which usually means serving them in some way) – This can look like Toastie Tuesday, Quizzes in the Liberton High School Library, Fischy Music concerts etc.


After sowing seeds and making relationships, we then will invite

them somewhere they can hear about God if they seem interested. These are things like Young Life Club, Wyld Life Club, Messy Church, Summer Buzz, Stage n Slam etc. Often an invite to some food or some games and an opportunity to hear a gospel message. So that young people can hear for possibly the first time that Jesus knows them, loves them and died for them.

The next step would be inviting them into a space where we could go a bit

deeper, answering any questions they might have about faith and giving them the opportunity to explore what they think of Jesus. We have groups like

Sunday Clubs, Sunday evening café worship and YL Connection groups available to come into a community of believers to discuss the bible and God in more depth. These are also great places to help us disciple and grow the young people we know with faith. For example, each month we have a serving Sunday for our teenagers at our morning service where they find different ways to get involved with the church service, maybe helping with teas and




coffees or the tech desk, or serving in creche – We do this to help them meet other people within the church and show them what it is to take part in a service, not just attend.

So much of Youth work is about the relationships the young people make with youth leaders and other believers who care about reaching them with the truth of the gospel. I, myself am a product of the local youth mission working! It is because of the relationships with leaders and events within the local church and Young Life that I heard about Jesus' love for me and I am grateful for the

years of ministry before me that have brought me into the role of Youth Worker at Liberton Kirk.

There are times that we meet kids who we love and we feel like we are following all the right steps just for them to age out of the groups and still not make any proclamation of faith. It's important for us to know that even if we never see a young person again, God loves and cares for them deeply and even though we may never find out if they are saved, we can trust that the Lord will use the work of our hands for His good.

Among the many beautifully retold Bible stories for small children and the inspiring fantasies for young people, where are the novels featuring 'normal' heroes and heroines living contemporary lives? I couldn't find many, so I endeavoured to write one! Two, in fact.

In Hide and Secret, Ruth and her pal Christopher befriend a traumatised refugee, teach him English and introduce him to Edinburgh. They are obliged to keep him a secret until he is well, so he won't be sent away. But how do you keep a secret without telling lies?

In Island Treasure, Christopher is devastated when his family moves from Edinburgh to a Hebridean island and he struggles to settle in. But Ruth visits and they make new friends – Nabila and her brother Mounir. They fall foul of the local bully and Nabila almost drowns until Christopher and Ruth come to the rescue.

In each book, the young people aim to live out their Christian faith, both in everyday situations and in the adventures and crises that come their way.

In 2024 we are considering *BEFORE THE GOOD NEWS – GOD'S PLAN BEGINS* as we step back into the Old Testament, and pause at our times of Midday Devotion to pray for others in our church family, our city and our world.




This is not an easy book to read in one sense. But...it is the book I have re-read the most (after the Bible of course!).

I cannot recommend this book enough. It has changed my Christian walk with Jesus and I hope it would help you also to walk closer with Jesus, imperfect as we are.



Growing Together

Andrei Rublev's icon of the Trinity depicts the three mysterious strangers who visited Abraham (Genesis 18:1-15). It speaks powerfully of the relationship between the three persons of Godhead. 'God as Being exists in community.'



Therefore, small groups provide an

important place where we can grow as whole-life disciples, hence the significance of the number 3. As Paul writes: 'So then, just as you received Christ Jesus as Lord, continue to live your lives in Him, rooted and built up in Him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and overflowing with thankfulness.' (Colossians 2: 6,7). Small groups provide a healthy environment which encourages spiritual growth, as relationships are made and a sense of belonging established.

Groups go by different names: home groups, cell groups, care groups, discipleship groups etc. Whatever the name, the focus should be the same: a gathering of people committed to spiritual growth. Unfortunately, it's easy for them to become inward looking and cliquey. So where do the challenges lie?

Small groups are places for growth: Groups are not simply places to share information about ourselves and the Bible, etc. They are places of formation, where we can learn to grow Christ-like character i.e. developing the fruit of the Spirit, and then exploring the Spirit's gifts in a safe place of experimenting and making mistakes.

Small groups are places for accountability: In a group we're not on our own, but we share the Christian journey with those who can encourage us on the way. These are the people who can hold us to account about how things are going: 'what is God doing in my life and how do I need to grow?'

Small groups are places for mission: Small groups also provide a place where we can voice the story of how God has been at work in our lives and is using us. This gives us the confidence that we need to share our story with work colleagues, friends and family, as we speak of our faith in Christ.

One lady told how she took her granddaughter to church for the first time. As they knelt in the tall-sided pew, the little girl whispered, 'Who are we hiding from?' It is harder to hide from ourselves or from one another in the smaller group, than in the crowd.

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


