

Ever been in love?

If there is one thing that all societies and cultures seem to have in common. it's the 'love song'.

If you were to google the top 100 most popular songs of the last century, you would find that most of them are songs about love. And this is not just the case in Western Culture. My own experience of life in a society where dating was frowned upon and most marriages were arranged between families was the same - the most popular songs in films and on the radio were always love ballads.

Our love of love seems to have been around for a very long time. One of the earliest love songs recorded can be found buried in the heart of the Old Testament. It's called the 'Song of Songs', and it is believed by many to have been sung as part of Hebrew wedding celebrations.

Song of Songs is the source of one or two well-known sayings -

"I am a rose of Sharon, a lily of the valley."

"Like a lily among thorns is my darling among the maidens"

(Song of Songs 2.1,2)

It is also the inspiration of a well known chorus we used to sing as children -'He brought me to his banqueting

table, and his banner over me is love I am my beloved's and he is mine, and

his banner over me is love'

Why do we make such a fuss about romantic love? This is a question that's John x

hard to answer if you've never been in love yourself. How do you know if you are in love? You know when it dawns on you that someone else's thoughts and feelings matter to you more than your own. And even more astonishing is the possibility that they might feel the same way about you.

St Valentine's Day is traditionally the time when couples celebrate their love for each other. But, at the very heart of true love is the idea of self-sacrifice something we can all celebrate every single day of our lives. Not our selfsacrifice, but that of the one who is the source of all love.

"Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love.


This is how God showed his love among us: He sent his one and only Son into the world that we might live through him. No one has ever seen God: but if we love one another. God lives in us and his love is made complete in us."



Until it was gone



The last vines cling for life, perhaps defiantly out of man's natural reach, on Remembrance Sunday 2024.

Take one last look, for the ivy is now gone.

Every year, we saw the blanket of leaves turn a beautiful red as the year grew old. How full of light and colour they were in the shorter

days. And how happy the photographers were who visited from afar to capture the autumnal splendour.

The visitors will still come, but they will be greeted with the beauty of stone unobscured by vegetation to fully reveal the architectural features of James Gillespie Graham's penmanship.

The doors will remain red in a homage to the lost ivy. Or perhaps they were just always that colour.

The presence of Boston Ivy over the years caused some stones to become a bit crumbly. It spread into nooks and crannies even Gillespie Graham did not design, and the Scottish mist brought moisture in the air that the ivy retained against the wall for longer than is desired. The Kirk Session explored its options, but could only conclude that voluntary maintenance was no longer an option in view of modern working-at-height regulations, and professional maintenance was too costly, especially when faced with the long-term adverse effects the ivy caused to the stone.

Autumn teaches us the beauty of letting go. Our Boston Ivy was allowed to see out its last autumn, but the old things are passed away.

Perhaps we never quite knew what we had until it was gone.


It's not a 11 day resolution, it's an ongoing resolution to keep on "praying for 5" that is the core message of TKC.

New Year resolutions aside, this is to encourage us all to keep praying for our 5 even when it seems like nothing is happening. Pete Greig of 24/7 Prayer shares a useful image he attributes to Frank Laubach, an American missionary (1884-1970).

"If you see a man chucking rocks into a swamp, it just seems pointless. Every rock just sinks without trace. But if that man keeps throwing rocks for long enough, eventually, instead of a plop, you'll hear a click and the rocks will begin to appear on the surface and he'll be able to walk through. Persevering in prayer is like chucking rocks in a swamp – eventually you see a breakthrough. It may take years of throwing all the words you have at the heavens, years of sighing and thinking of the person you are praying for before you see the miracle. Sometimes it feels like I'm just chucking another rock in the swamp, but I am not going to give up"

Thy Kingdom Come 2025 starts 29th May. But don't wait 'til then, find your list, make a new list, and keep on adding to that pile of rocks.





Reflecting Faith: Church Buildings

Calum Gubby's reflection on the changing look of Liberton Kirk (page 9) prompted the inclusion of this little reflection by the Rev Dr Jo White.

What impression do you have when you first see a church building?

Most of us have visited many church buildings, either to worship or as a tourist: to enjoy the splendour, the colours, the style and the architecture, with or without necessarily a time of prayer or worship.

There are some amazingly staggering designs around the world – one only has to think of the complex and intricate stone carving of Gaudi's catholic basilica in Barcelona, Spain (due to be completed next year!) and then compare that to the sleekness of the Lutheran (Church of Iceland) parish church in Reykjavík, Iceland.


How about the grandeur of St Peter's in Rome, full of baroque gold and rich colours? Or what about St Basil's Cathedral in Red Square, Moscow – now a museum but topped with amazingly coloured onion domes?

Just looking at the outside of a building tells you a lot about what it is likely to be like inside, the purpose of the building and the style of worship to expect there. It's not just about the condition of the fabric, or the tidiness of the grounds but rather the architecture itself. When we see a contemporary modern building, we will expect the worship to match it: whether that is Protestant, Catholic or any other denomination.

So, if you were designing a brand-new church building today, what would you put into it and therefore what would the exterior look like? What would you want on the outside, to express your faith? Would you include any specific Christian symbols, or be more all-encompassing?
