Happy Endings

Why do we all just love a happy ending? Whether we're watching a Disney movie, a romantic comedy, or even a detective series where the two main protagonists are obviously attracted to each other but never seem to realize it, why is it that, however badly things are going for them, we still keep watching to the end?

Why is it that we start reading our way through a lengthy novel where nothing appears to be going right, but we're still determined to read to the end in the hope that things will get better?

Gavin Matthews suggests that, rather than putting this tendency down to our love of delusion and escapism, the opposite is actually the case, when he says, "Maybe we love happy endings so much because they point to something true?"

Later this month, we are going to be joining with Christians across the world to celebrate the unlikeliest of happy endings. The true story of a hero who came on a rescue mission for the whole of humankind and got off to a great start. But then it all starts to go wrong, and he ends up betrayed, abandoned, unjustly accused, wrongly condemned and crucified.

But then there is an unexpected happy ending, because, by his death,

Jesus wins his greatest victory – of love over hate, forgiveness over vengeance, and life over death. And three days later he defies all logic, natural bounds, and reason to rise from the dead in his glorious resurrection.

As a result, we live in a postresurrection world, where, whatever happens, we know the best is still to come;

Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting? But thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through Jesus Christ, our Lord. (Romans 15.55,57)

I'm well aware as I write these words that Lindsay and I are heading towards the end of what, personally speaking, has been one of the happiest phases of our lives – a life surrounded by people who love us, and working together in the service of our faithful God.

Lindsay and I, and you, the folks of Liberton and South East Edinburgh, do not know what the future holds, and it may well have its ups and downs. But, whatever happens, my advice is this: don't give up on God, for he will never give up on you, and with Him there will always be a happy ending.



The current Bible passage in the Kirkyard (starting at the Offering House at the main gate) is John 15, verses 1 – 13, "I am the Vine". 


In April we journey through Lent and Easter-time.

April Books

Max Lucado's book, **'He Chose the Nails'**, is a contemplation of Christ's pain and sacrifice at the Crucifixion, and considers Jesus' suffering anew. Much has been said about the cross, but Lucado asks, 'What about the other gifts?' What of the nails, the crown of thorns, the garments taken by the soldiers or the blood and water?

Lucado states that God was never more sovereign than on that day, that nothing happened by accident. Also, why did Jesus choose to endure such suffering?

So begins Lucado's examination; nails fix broken things; they join together things that are separated. Because Christ 'couldn't bear eternity without us, He chose the nails'. Scripture often describes our behaviour as the clothes we

wear, and like His character, Jesus' robe was seamless; uninterrupted, woven in one piece from top to bottom. Then, there were the two crosses next to Jesus that day; with Jesus in the centre. The two crosses symbolize one of God's greatest gifts; the gift of choice. Then, Pilate chose the sign, 'This is the King of the Jews', and through doing so became God's instrument. Because of that sign the thief's soul was saved.

God chose the path; He selected the nails. The last moments of Jesus' death were all intentional. Through contemplation of the Cross, and every detail of the Crucifixion something of the nature of God is revealed. Lucado's book invites reflection, a heart-connection and thoughtfulness, and a deeper revelation of the unbearable sacrifice of Jesus.

'Family Matters,' is the third stand-alone sequel for teens by local author Helen Parker. After 'Hide and Secret,' in which Ruth and Christopher hide an asylum seeker and teach him English, and 'Island Treasure,' where Christopher saves a young refugee from drowning, readers meet these two friends again, a year older.







Lighting up learning in Malawi

The Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, Rt Rev Dr Shaw Paterson has challenged people to support an initiative that has the potential to transform students' lives in Malawi.

The idea was sparked during Dr Paterson's visit to Malawi in the autumn. He was struck by the determination of the people there, and particularly within the Church, to ensure education at all levels becomes available and accessible to all. But without lights in their homes children could not study after dark.

Simple solar lights allow extra time for children to learn in villages with no electricity and so it is dark at 6.30pm. 
