A Place of Encounter

There is a collection of intricately carved ancient stone crosses near the western door of the National Museum of Scotland, and one of these was found in a field near Liberton Kirk. Its design includes motifs from the Celtic Christian community of Lindisfarne, adding weight to the theory that Christianity was brought to Edinburgh by Northumbrian missionaries under the leadership of St Cuthbert.

10 years ago, as we celebrated the 200th anniversary of our current church building at Liberton Kirk, a busload of us went on a pilgrimage, via Melrose, to Lindisfarne.

The culmination of our pilgrimage was our barefoot walk across the morning sand at low tide to the Holy Isle, and the day was spent in exploration and reflection, culminating in a service of thanksgiving in the grounds of the abbey.

It was on our return that we set up our weekly prayer room in Liberton Kirk Centre. Every Tuesday, from 7.30am -7.30pm, the Wilson Hall has been set aside as an 'upper room' – open to anyone who wants to use it.

The room is designed to be a space where God can be encountered. It includes a number of different 'prayer stations' –

A place to write down what you want to say to God

A place to write down what you think God might be saying to you

A place to sit and relax
A place to make music
A place to read God's Word
A prayer tree where you can leave your prayers for others

It's also a place where we can pray together. At noon every Tuesday you'll find a growing number of people gathering for 'midday prayers', where we share and pray and enjoy each other's company.

And, for those who struggle to know what to say, we have a selection of prayers from the Northumbrian Community which we read together.

More recently mention has been made of the need to make the Tuesday Prayer Room more accessible – particularly for those who might struggle with stairs. **So, during Lent this year, it will be moving next door to the ground floor of Kirk House.**

The Bible says "*Be still and know that I am God*" (Psalm 46:10). Lent is traditionally the time when we all try to slow down a bit, and focus our hearts and minds on the God who reveals himself to us in Jesus. Can I challenge you, therefore, if you have a spare moment during Lent, make full use of the resources available to help you do this – the 'Word for Today' in the Kirkyard, and the Tuesday Prayer Room in the Kirk House. I promise you – your time won't be wasted.

hurt man is done for!

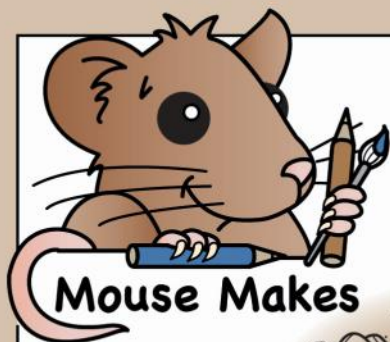
What? No!

World Day of Prayer is an international, ecumenical organization which enables us to hear the thoughts of women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns and prayers. The preparation for the day is vast, the service begins with the writing country and theme being chosen a number of years earlier. It passes through international, national, regional and local committees for planning and presenting.

The Day of Prayer is celebrated in over 120 countries. It begins in Samoa and prayer in native languages travels throughout the world — through Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas before finishing in American Samoa some 38 hours later. A worldwide wave of prayer...





FOOD BANK (BASICS BANK) AT TRON KIRK

Liberton Kirk Donations 2024

At present, we have strong contacts with the Tron Food Bank – which the Tron Folks call Basics Bank, as it includes toiletries, etc.

The present arrangements involve donations in kind (tins, dried food, UHT milk, ready meals, and toiletries) – which are usually left in the 2 boxes in the Offering House. These boxes are re-located to the Macdonald Room when the Offering House is used for other purposes – e.g. the Christmas scene. We also welcome folks dropping things in at our house, ideally towards end of each week, so that what is given, can be taken in the usual Friday transfer.

The normal system is to collect at the Kirk, on most Friday Mornings and take straight up to Tron, by about 9.30 – 10 am. This works well.

We also welcome cash/cheque donations. If cash is received, it is banked at the Post Office at Liberton Gardens, and the SEECOS Treasurer is advised of the sum lodged, and that it is specifically for the Food Bank. In 2024 a record was kept of the funds channelled in this way. The Total was £1,670. In addition the Gilmerton Singers donated the proceeds of their Concert in the Liberton Kirk Halls. This amounted to the excellent sum of £820 – so the total from these sources was £2,490.

The Contractors at the new Liberton High School had a charity fund-raise for the Food Bank. What they had bought was collected and transferred this (in 2 car-loads) to the Tron. Further the wee Nursery School on Kirk Brae had a Harvest Thanksgiving and they made contact. Their donations were also transferred to the Tron Food Bank.

Thanks go to all who have supported the work so far. I would be glad to respond to anyone seeking further information. This is clearly a good way to engage with our brothers and sisters in SEECOS.

Kirkgate café opened it's doors 10 years ago last month and here is our story so far.....

In the 1990's Liberton Kirk Centre was extended to include the foyer and the kitchen area we have today. Ann Weir, one of our elders, had a vision that this space was ideal for a café and duly presented this idea repeatedly to the Kirk Session over the next 15 years, but the Session wasn't so sure.

Ann, who was professionally trained and co-ordinated many big catering events for the Kirk, helped with the weekly morning *Monday Café* and *Tuesday tea*, and the monthly *Wednesday Soup Pot* with Helen Sutherland, persevered and finally in 2014 the Kirk Session voted to go with it. Hallelujah. Thank you, Ann.

A committee was appointed, fund raising carried out, and we were able to purchase the furniture and equipment required. We were fortunate to appoint Norma Brown who had experience of running a cafe as a salaried manager and a small army of volunteers who were very keen to see the café succeed.

The Café opened on 2 February 2015 trading Monday to Wednesday and within about a year we extended to Thursdays too. After 7 years of consistently building relationships with our local community and attracting more volunteers to join the team and making the café succeed, Norma left us to start a new café adventure in Livingston. Jenny Thomasi, who had many years catering experience, was appointed in June 2022 as café manager. She continues to develop the café and build strong relationships within the community and church.

Our customers whose ages are from birth to about 100 years and our dedicated volunteers make the café the successful, welcoming, safe place to be which is ideal for meeting friends over a coffee and where you can have a freshly prepared lunch at prices that are very reasonable. From 2024 we restarted – during term time only – evening café on Tuesday from 5 to 8pm and Wednesday from 6 to 8pm to serve drinks and cakes only.

If you haven't been before then why not pop in one day.

On Sunday 6th April during the Sunday morning services, Kirkgate will be celebrating 10 successful years by taking part throughout the services at 9.30am or 11am and you are welcome to come along. *Jill Niven, Café Board Convener*

Everyone who comes looks forward to it each week, and you can see how it's helping all of us grow in faith and friendship.

If you haven't come along yet, we'd love for you to join us! There's coffee, good company, and a chance to connect with others while growing in your relationship with God. We hope to see you there!

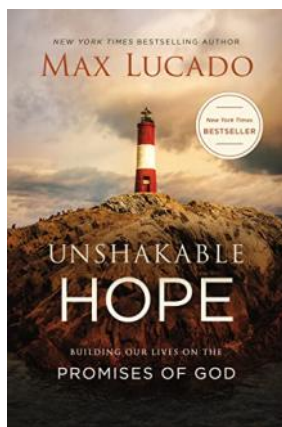

Unshakable Hope: Building Our Lives on the Promises of God by Max Lucado



This is Max Lucado's 40th book - and as with his other writing it can also be accessed through YouTube and other Bible Study resources. He addresses the storms we face as humans - the things that make us feel shaky! Lucado presents us with 12 significant Bible Promises which remind us that we are equipped to not only face up to but to overcome difficult circumstances.

We face all kinds of challenges - Christians are not exempt from disease, cancer, loss of jobs and livelihood, mental illness, relationship breakdowns. Any of these issues can cause even a strong Christian

to become overwhelmed.

This book reminds us of wonderful Bible promises we have probably read/heard preached on over many years, which become more significant when placed against life's storms that threaten to sink us. Life is shaky enough at times just trying to stay upright - when all around us seems like sandy land. We need to be anchored and Lucado helps us to look closer at scripture as he shows us how to be anchored in the unbreakable promises of God with unshakeable hope.

In Chapter 7 'God Gets You' 'Our High Priest is able to understand our weaknesses' Lucado gives account and illustrates falling - how sometimes, despite our best efforts we land flat on our backs. 'We have stumbled' - not with torn ligaments but with broken hearts, weary spirits and fading vision'. He reminds us that when Jesus walked this earth He was not in a protective bubble. He faced its uncomfortable, painful, almost unbearable parts and still He stood - even to death on that ugly cross.

One amazing account of a man imprisoned in a communist country for his faith and almost 'forced' to renounce his faith through the threat of his family being killed - God came and saved them all, preventing the man having to give up his precious, strong faith in Christ - the miracle came just in time! I would recommend this book as a 'go to' when facing life's storms. Lucado's illustrations are really helpful, and God's Promises serve as strong reminders of our anchor, despite all.

Bibles for Bairns

An initiative from the Scottish Bible Society offers every baby born in Scotland a free Share a Story toddler Bible on their first birthday. Every birthday after that until the age of 5 the child will receive a Bible-related gift, and on their fifth birthday they will receive an early reader Bible to take them through their primary school years.

Babies born in 2024 can be registered **up to 31st March 2025** to receive these gifts. If you know a baby who is eligible, do let their family know about Bibles for Bairns so that they can register their child.

You can register a child yourself but you must have the agreement of the parents. You can register on line at bible.scot/bfb or with the registration forms available in the Kirk Centre entrance and the Offering House. Babies born in 2025 will be able to be registered for the scheme from September or October, but don't delay if you know a 2024 bairn!

What a great idea this is to encourage even the very young to become familiar with the Bible stories! The Church of Scotland Guild is supporting Bibles for Bairns as one of its projects. The Scottish Bible Society welcomes donations to its work, and volunteers to pack the gifts and write the birthday cards at their headquarters in Hampton Terrace, Edinburgh.

March Book Review: **Facing Your Giants**

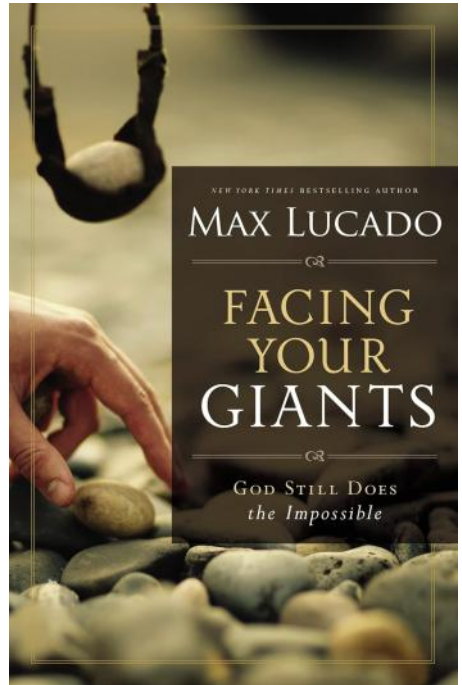
Facing Your Giants by Max Lucado is a Christian self-help book that uses the story of David and Goliath from the Bible to illustrate how individuals can overcome personal obstacles and challenges. No matter how big our “giants” may seem, with faith in God, we can rise above them. The author emphasizes that giants come in many forms—fear, failure, illness, loneliness—and offers readers a spiritual roadmap for confronting and overcoming these struggles.

The book is at times a challenging read, somewhat uncomfortable as the reader connects with similar circumstances to that which David found himself in.

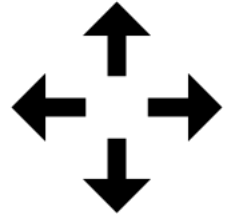
The psychological challenges it seems that faced humanity then are broadly speaking the same now. It’s timeless and as relevant today as it was then.

Lucado's writing is deeply personal, providing both inspiration and practical advice. Through a blend of storytelling and biblical wisdom, he encourages readers to embrace God’s promises and trust in His plan, even when faced with seemingly insurmountable challenges. He highlights that, just like David, we too can confront our giants with courage, not because of our own strength, but because of God's power working through us.

What makes *Facing Your Giants* effective is its combination of motivational messages and a strong spiritual foundation. Lucado’s reflections on faith and perseverance may perhaps resonate with readers facing personal hardships, offering hope and a renewed sense of purpose. Overall, this book serves as both a guide and a source of encouragement for anyone navigating difficult times, reminding us that no giant is too great when God is by our side.

Update on Safeguarding at Liberton Kirk and SEECOS

We have a wonderful range of activities at Liberton Kirk which support children and vulnerable adults in many different ways. Around 90 people volunteer to help with this regulated work across SEECOS – and around half of these volunteers are based within the Liberton Kirk family.

We use the term “Safeguarding” to describe our approaches to prevent harm to children and vulnerable adults; and to make a timely and appropriate response whenever this is witnessed, suspected or reported.

Preventing harm Before being appointed, anyone volunteering for work with children or vulnerable adults is registered as a member of Disclosure Scotland’s Protecting Vulnerable Groups (PVG) scheme. Volunteers can also benefit from introductory safeguarding training – if you’re a volunteer for this type of work, please look out for announcements of training opportunities later this year.

Timely response The simple safeguarding message is: if harm or abuse is suspected or witnessed, or is reported to you, immediately inform your Safeguarding Coordinator at the email address below. They’ll then refer it on to the Safeguarding Service for guidance on any actions that may be needed.

Your Safeguarding Coordinator at Liberton Kirk is Chris Weir. Chris is one of two SEECOS Safeguarding Coordinators, the other being Muriel Galbraith (Tron Kirk Moredun & Gilmerton). They’re supported in this work by a SEECOS Safeguarding Panel, which includes representatives from each SEECOS location. They also have access to expert confidential advice from the Church of Scotland’s Safeguarding Service:

He was struck by the determination of the people there, and particularly within the Church, to ensure education at all levels becomes available and accessible to all. But without lights in their homes children could not study after dark.

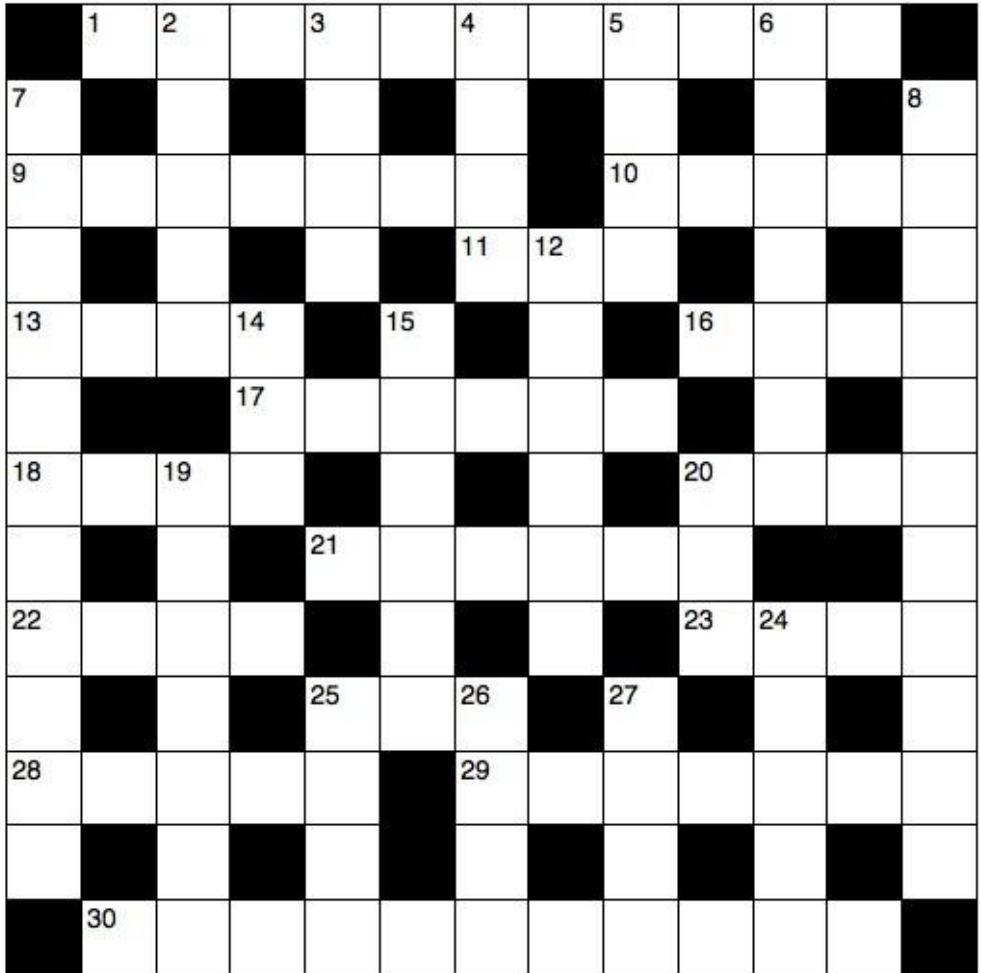

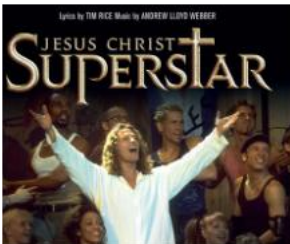
